## Abandonment of Capital Trips Seen After This Year

Possibility that the annual trips of Baldwin High School students to Washington, D. C., will be abandoned this year loomed at a meeting of the Board of Education last Thursday night when the Board must determine if the 1934 Washington group trip is desirable. It is probable that the Board will postpone the trip indefinitely.

Later, Earl G. Miller, secretary, told the Board the educational value of student trips to the national capital was being seriously questioned in school circles, and said it might be expected that the Michigan Education Association would shortly recommend discontinuance of the trips entirely.

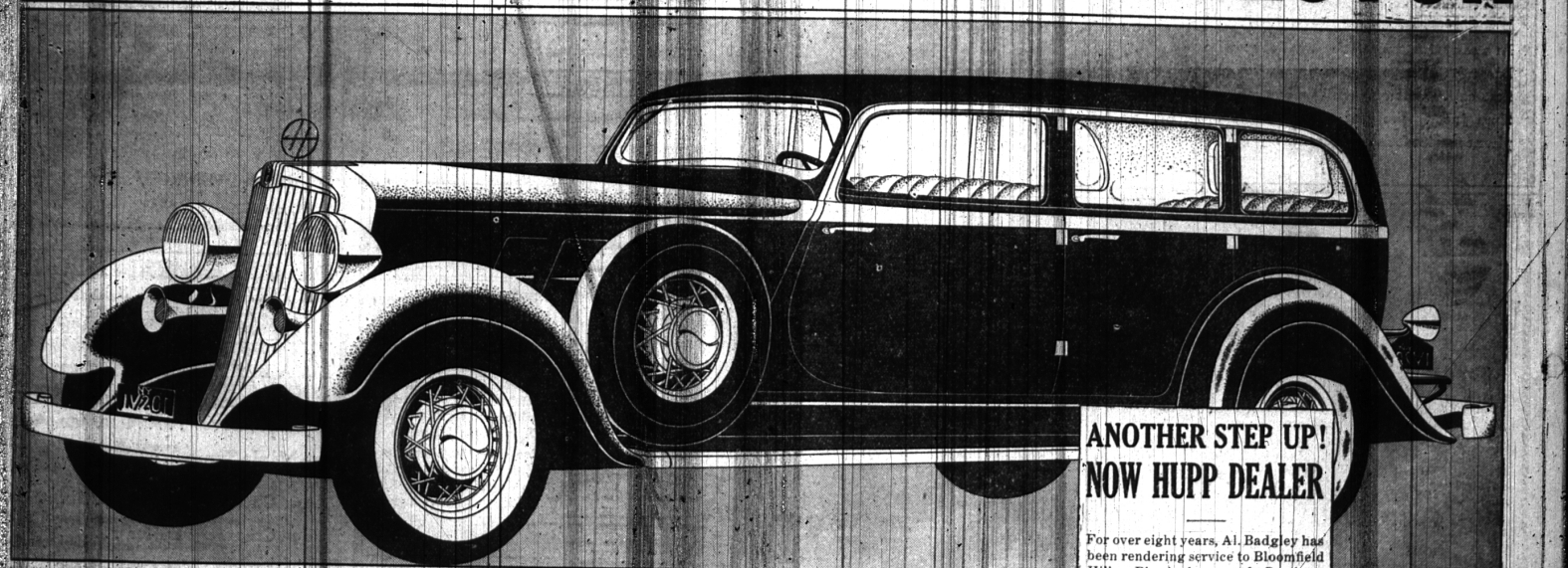
