Activities, Achievements of Community House Are Reviewed in Annual Reports

A detailed review of the activities and achievements of the Birmingham Community House for the past year were contained in reports of the director and heads of various departments, presented at the annual meeting of the Community House Association Monday night.

The complete report of Mrs. Hope P. Lewis, the director, is published in full below, together with summaries of the other reports.

Director's Report

It is a great pleasure to come before you tonight with the story of the Community House since last February. The special reports will be given by staff members and chairmen of the committees. It remains my privilege to paint the general picture and give a well deserved word of appreciation to those who have made this accomplishment possible.

In the first place, of course, you must realize that this Community House is not just a few days a year if you members here assembled and those others whom we represent had not contributed the savings of year in the last campaign for funds and those other campaigns which preceded it.

This institution is not in its nature self-supporting, nor can it ever be. Revenue producing activity must be a part of the Community House program. The main vision of the house was that of a friendly neighborhood center where clubs might meet and cultural and educational pursuits be comfortably housed. That vision has expanded in every possible direction with the changing conditions and the possibilities of the future are limited only by the time and energy and money the residents of this community are willing to put into a true social service project.

Kind Devotion

To you we owe an honest "thank you." There are among the membership scores of devoted souls who are always willing to add hours of service to welfare and recreational work, and who believe so thoroughly in the Community House that they have worked willingly and long whenever opportunity offered. It has been an added advantage to have with us the recently returned veterans of the entire field of war who have worked with us in the past year.

My story would not be complete without a mention of the gratitude to my loyal workers. Mrs. Edith S. Wall has served as part-time secretary and has worked as a resident teacher. She has taken over the responsibility of correlating the Home program—providing an arranging force of the many of the job to keep the program in order, making every group who use the House happy and busy every day and in odd times she helps to see that the place will happen to need it. She has been a source of strength and inspiration always and I am most grateful for the able assistance she has rendered.

BOWLING BAN MAY BE LIFTED

Commission Expected to Allow Alleys to Open on Sundays

Permission of bowling in Birmingham on Sundays is expected to be granted by the Village Commission next Monday night, majority of the commissioners spoke favorably for lifting the Sunday ban on bowling alleys last Monday's meeting and the city Attorney, C. H. Ordway, was instructed to prepare the necessary ordinance and restriction ordinance to be voted on at the next meeting.

The discussions followed the reading of a letter from Russ Chapman, proprietor of the Birmingham Bowling Alleys in the "Heater Building" which cleared the income from Sunday bowling is necessary for the maintenance of his business. He pointed out that several Birmingham bowlers are in the habit of going to Pontiac to meet and play on Sundays, and he pointed to the operation of an orderly establishment if the ban would be lifted.

Previous Resolutions Denied

A similar request has been made to the Village Commission periodically for the past several years, but has always been denied.

"There is no objection," said Mr. Chapman's remark, a good piece, said Village President Harry G. "I have heard nothing but commendations about it. Business is all in my favor of Sunday bowling because I am all right and I will lead the way to the opening of pool rooms and other places. It is not a question of granting or refusing a favor to Mr. Chapman."

"Don't you think," asked Commissioner E. W. Stoffer, "that any place where you are permitted to play a game should be allowed to open on Sunday?" He mentioned the large investment Mr. Chapman has in his establishment and pointed out that the Commission has the power to limit the number of any place which because of disorderly or noisiness.

"Halbert Priddy," competing for the license, said he was in favor of the ordinance proposed to permit alleys to open on Sunday.

"I don't think," he said, "operating pool rooms can be run as good a case as Mr. Chapman can." He said Commissioner W. C. Conley, and Commissioner Frank S. Peckard followed with "I like to see the ordinance amended to permit him to keep them."

The amendment will be recommended by the Commission if any considerable amount of public sentiment is worked by lifting the restriction.

"He opens up," he said, "going to have competition. Commissioner Lawrence Peckard opposed, but fellow members said they believed this was wise."

Peterson Appointed To Poor Commission
