Chase To Be Tried On Forgery Count

Electrician Bound Over To Circuit Court After Examination Here
Accused of forging the name of Axel O. Nelson, Pontiac realtor, to check for \$30, Arthur Chase, 33 years old, of 426 Townsend street, an electrician, was bound over to Circuit Court for trial by Justice Floyd S. Buck Friday morning. Cash bond of \$250, previously posted, was renewed.

Chase had denied the alleged forgery, claiming that he received the check from Nelson in payment of wages. At the hearing Friday, Nelson testified that he did not owe the money to Chase and did not give him the check. The check was cashed in December, 1931.

Walter L. Moreland, former assistant cashier of the Birmingham Savings Bank, identified the check and testified that the signature it bore was not Nelson's. Donald Miller, former teller in the Birmingham Savings Bank, is the plaintiff in the case.
