Property Damage By Fire Held To \$4,761 In 1932

The total damage to property in Birmingham in 1932 amounted to \$4,761.50, a per capita loss of 47 cents, according to an annual report of Fire Chief Vernon W. Griffith, issued today.

Although more than \$3,000 greater than the damage of the previous year, the 1932 loss was next to the smallest of any in the past five years.

In 1930 the total damage was \$37,183.98; in 1929, \$9,150, or 87 cents per capita; and in 1928, \$15,235, or 81 cents per capita.

There were only 168 silent alarms in 1932 as compared with 196 in 1931, and only 14 in the preceding year.

Firemen spent 109 hours and 29 minutes during the year in actual fire fighting, traveling 221 miles to and from the alarms.
