SCOUT NEWS

BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA

Birmingham Boy Scout troops will not be without representation when the President Hoover awards for achievement during 1932 are made in February. Troop 23, under the leadership of Harold Wester, and Troop 24, led by Alfred Schulz, are two groups that have successfully completed the necessary requirements to qualify them for the honor. The award is based on the number of boys a troop has registered by Dec. 31, 1932, the degree of advancement made during 1932 and the knowledge that officers of the troop and troop committee have of the "Ten Year Program of Growth." Troop B-2's enrollment at the end of December showed a total of 122 boys, while B-2's showed 51, a gain of three. In advancement, B-2 netted 86 points, while B-3 gained 101 points.

According to Clarence Cummings, Sr., director of test camps, it will be necessary in the future for all scouts desiring to attend or first class tests to have their advancement card and the examination they wish to have previously approved by their scoutmaster. No consideration will be granted scouts who do not obey this ruling.

The regular monthly outdoor test camp will be held Saturday afternoon in the ravine of West Maple Avenue.
