Grandson Of Chief To Preach In Local Church

The grandson of Chief Sitting Bull of the Sioux Indians, whose tribal name is Sitting Bull Boy, but who is otherwise known as Herbert Welch, will preach and sing from the pulpit of the First Presbyterian Church at the Sunday evening service.

Sitting Bull Boy will appear in his native regalia and will sing the ancient "Song To The Sun," to the accompaniment of the tom-tom, as it was chanted by his early Sioux ancestors. Two Christian hymns, one in the Sioux language and the other in English, will be sung by Mr. Welch.

Following his musical offerings, he will preach briefly on "Meditation As An Approach to God," which has been among the Sioux Indians in South Dakota. He received his education at a mission school at Wapahila, S. D., at Sturgis, Mich., and at the normal school at Hampton, Va. He plans to complete the theological training necessary to become an ordained minister.
