


City Taxes May Be Paid On The Installment Plan

Birmingham property owners will have the opportunity of paying their taxes in installments this year for the first time in history. Property owners for installments payments were made in the new city charter, and are outlined on the 1933 tax statements which are now being prepared in the office of Harold M. Corson, city treasurer.

Each taxpayer may elect to pay on the installment plan or in full. If he chooses the installment plan, he must pay at least 30 per cent of his entire tax bill before July 15, plus a charge of 2 per cent on the remainder. The remainder must be paid before March 1 of next year, when the full next year's charge of three-quarters of 1 per cent per month or fraction of a month on amounts paid after Aug. 31.

The taxpayer may adopt any method he chooses for paying the remaining 70 per cent of his tax after the original 30 per cent is paid. Mr. Corson said, "It may be paid in regular installments, weekly, monthly or by any other period, or may be paid in full at any time before Mar. 1."

If the installment plan is not followed from the beginning, taxes may be paid any time before Sept. 1 without penalty or interest. Beginning with that date, a charge of three-quarters of 1 per cent will be made on all unpaid balances until Mar. 1 of next year, when the full next year's charge of three-quarters of 1 per cent per month or fraction of a month on amounts paid after Aug. 31.
