

Commencement Exercises Close Year At Cranbrook

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 The following exercises, presided over by the members of the faculty in caps and gowns, the post-prandial songs and toasts carried on by a quartet of long-stemmed glasses, marched in procession to the front of the church where they remained standing until the invocation had been pronounced by Rev. S. S. Marquis, and the song "Amen to Thee" had been sung at the request of the school.
 Dr. Kathryn McHale, director of the American Association of University Women and professor of education at Goucher College, was commencement speaker, and made for members of the class certain feminine characteristics which, it was felt, would tend to make their lives richer, deeper and broader.
 Dr. McHale cited the 10 women who, after extensive research by the American Association of University Women, were selected recently as the most outstanding women of the past century, not only for the reforms they created and the work they did, but also for the fact that always they kept before them the ideal that "life finds loveliness."
 These women—Lacretia Mott, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony, Emma Willard, Alice Freeman Palmer, Margaret Fuller Wood, Dorothea Lynde Dix, Maria Mitchell, Elizabeth Blackwell and Jane Barton—were the first to realize the importance of education and participation for women in the fields of medicine and astronomy as well as in the social and political fields, yet at no time did they lose sight of their ideal, the speaker declared.
 The achievements of these women, Dr. McHale stated, "as well as their personalities, enabled them to stand along with the men who were their contemporaries. What these women represent may be captioned as objectives for the 20th century woman—courage, clear thinking, unselfishness, personal achievement, the recognition that life holds loveliness, loyalty, open-mindedness, tolerance, courtesy and clarity as well as a dignified personal appearance."
 Following Dr. McHale's address, the school gave a presentation of the graduates and certificates to the first graduates by Dr. Katharine Jones Adams, principal. Presentation of the school flag, which had been in the custody of the senior class, was made by Joseph E. Page, chairman of the Board of Directors of the school, after which the president of the outgoing senior class, Virginia Smith, turned the flag over to Virginia Hunt, the incoming president.

 The highest award—the school citizenship medal—was conferred upon Leo P. Patinelli of Lansing, senior class president and star athlete. Kirkland B. Alexander, Jr., of Detroit, received honorable mention.
 Of 13 awards for scholarship bestowed upon students in Birmingham or Bloomfield Hills boys, Thomas S. Talman of Birmingham, eighth form, received the highest scholarship list in the list forms, with Robert H. Porter, also of Birmingham, receiving honorable mention.
 Other awards by forms were second form, Frederick L. Grandjean, Birmingham, first, and Robert T. Herderson, Jr., Groves Point, honorable mention; third form, James N. Ruthenberg, Birmingham, first, and James C. Palmis, Bloomfield Hills, honorable mention; fourth form, H. Waldo Birt, Bloomfield Hills, first, and J. Philip Moses, Birmingham, honorable mention; fifth form, G. Robert Heavens, Bloomfield Hills, first, and David T.
