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Roaming Dog Brings Suspended Sentence
 A. H. Otis, 1118 Parkington, pleaded guilty before Justice Forbes S. Hascall in Municipal Court Tuesday morning to a charge of allowing his dog to roam free in violation of the city ordinance. He previously had pleaded not guilty.
 He was fined \$3 cents, and the justice suspended payment for 60 days on condition the dog is properly confined within that time. It was the first case of the year involving the dog ordinance, which Chief of Police John P. Hackett has declared will be stringently enforced.

James W. Cobb, postmaster of the latest issue of 989 on deposit in postal savings office at Birmingham post office, was fined \$50 and suspended for 30 days for failing to file a report of his savings at the beginning of the year on the same level as that was last September, with reductions of any kind.
