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\$300 IN SAMPLES STOLEN FROM CAR

Five Cases of Merchandise Taken While Salesman Interviews Storekeeper

Five cases of salesman's samples containing hosiery, underwear, lace curtains and other merchandise valued at \$300, were stolen Monday afternoon from a car parked in front of the F. J. Milliland Company, 233 North Woodward avenue.

The owner, L. S. Tremper, 3250 Skovel Place, Detroit, district representative for Marshall Field and Company of Chicago, was in the store showing other drygoods samples to Mr. Milliland when the theft occurred.

He had been walking back and forth between the car and the store with the samples as intervals for some time, but noticed no one might have been the thief. A clerk in the store, however, saw two youths, about 20 years old, lurking about the car, but paid no particular attention to them.

The salesman has called on Mr. Milliland every two weeks for nine years, always parking his car in front of the store and leaving samples cases in it.
