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HYPOCRISY OF ASSAILED

God, Spurred In Time Of Plenty Oves Us Nothing, Wright Says

Because he spurred God in times of prosperity, man cannot rightly fully expect to be extricated from his difficulties by Divine assistance in times of economic and national stress like the present, declares W. Clarence Wright, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, in his sermon Sunday morning.

"Nationally and individually," Mr. Wright said, "prosperity developed an attitude of self-sufficiency and wrought a state of spiritual declension and national and individual weakness in us in more than one way."

"How clearly is it evident that nationally we need a return unto God and a resting not upon our own strength, but a resting upon the protecting arm of God."

"There are those who feel that God is not fair to America, that he owes her something better than she now experiences. We are gratified people on the whole, We have an honorable origin through pious ancestors."

"But what does God care whether or not our ancestors came over with the pilgrims? What virtue is there in his slight in culture and finances? God looks not on the outward appearance. God looks upon the heart and therein what is it that he beholds but rebellion and non-obedience."

"God said 'Thou shalt have no other Gods before me,' and yet we tolerate second-caliber professors in our institutions who try to pass judgment upon spiritual matters with which they have no experience and teach here-worshiping youth that our faith, our concepts of God, are invalid."

"God said, 'Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.' But 20 of our 48 states say in effect, partially or fully, 'Don't mind God's word. Sunday is holiday.'"

"The Lord said, 'Thou shalt not commit adultery,' while staff after staff of aerial existence and there one can dispose of the sixth husband and acquire the seventh in a matter of less than an hour amid applause and the click of the camera."

"A large proportion of parent-hood receives into the home a tiny, frail life, endowed with the potentials of eternal existence, complete secular education over, present and well, but is indifferent to the Christian training with the thought that the music lesson is far more important."
