MAPLE SQUAD UNBALANCED

Coach Predicts Poor Showing For Trackers in Dual Meets

Unless something unusual develops in the way of new track team candidates, the Baldwin High School 1933 track squad is going to be what Coach Franklin Whitney terms "unbalanced." Whitney says that although there are a few boys who excel in certain events and are good for a first in some events, the rest of the squad is below the usual caliber. Whitney does not believe, therefore, that the Maple squad will win many of its dual meets, but that it will be exceptionally strong in the state and regional contests this spring.

The bulk of this year's pointswinning will probably be done by Harry and Clayton Brelsford, Bill Gunkelberg and John McKee, all of whom met last season. Candidates Put To Test

Last Thursday afternoon, Whitney held practice contests in all events except the shot put, in the Baldwin gym, and got a fairly good line on what his candidates are.
