### CLUBS HEAR BANK TALKS

Manington, Vliet Address Rotarians And Exchangeites

Bank and the general subject of national monetary system of Birmingham Exchange and Rotary Clubs this week as T. H. Millington and Clarence Vliet addressed them. Mr. Vliet, former superintendent of public schools here, told the Exchangeites something of the American gold standard and the Federal Reserve System; and answered numerous questions asked by the members.

It was Mr. Vliet's opinion that the present financial crisis was brought on by laxity in banking and practices, increasing cost of government, and the hoarding and withdrawal of our gold reserves. He stated that we are leaning toward the federal issuance of paper currency and its attendant inflation.

Our national plight, because there is a credit nation not so rich as though we owned money to the rest of the world," stated Mr. Vliet.

Guaranty bank deposit plans presented by T. H. Millington of Bloomfield Hills, for more than a year has been conducting an investigation into the banking and currency problems of the country.

Recently Mr. Millington's plan for the creation of a huge Guaranty Deposit Trust fund, the capital of which is to come from member banks themselves, any drain on the independence of the federal treasury.

A super-board of directors with wide representation of the country, would supervise the Guaranty Deposit activities, would have power to eliminate crooked banks in any form of management, and could close any bad bank, drawing upon the reserves of the Guaranty for any deficiency in question. Ability to pay the depositors 100 cents on the dollar would do away with public banks, and would thus prevent runs on banks in other communities, as Birmingham declared.

### Family Threatened, Garage Man Claims

For Peace Bond After Feud With Former Employer

A hearing will be held in Manington Judge H. Russell Holland's court this morning on a demand from Claude E. Mosher, 728 East Lincoln avenue, Birmingham, for a peace bond insuring protection for Mosher and his family.

Charges made by Mosher that Callahan attempted on several occasions to wreck the car in which Mosher and his wife were riding, and that he threatened to kill Mosher in telephone conversations, followed a fist fight between the two men near the intersection of Woodward and Maple avenues Wednesday afternoon of last week.

The fight, which was said to have gotten out of an argument over a bill, Callahan alleges Mosher owes him for services when the former was driver for the garage man as a salesman, resulted in Callahan's arrest on an assault and battery charge. Callahan paid a \$5 fine and \$10 costs to Justice H. Augustus O'Dell of Bloomfield Hills.

Callahan pleaded not guilty to the new charges, contained in Mosher's petition for the posting of a peace bond, and was released on \$100 pending the hearing today.
