Defeat Highland Park Senior College In Meet Monday By 1-0

The Cranbrook School track team scored its first win of the season when it defeated the senior college last Friday by a score of 72 to 50. The meet took place in a driving rain and had some of the most interesting races of the day was the 220. At the start, the two Highland Park runners attempted to box Dick Adreese, and Bent Thompson, holding the outside of the track all the way around the curve, took first place and followed Adreese to cross the six and come in second. Thompson shaded Adreese by inches in a close finish.

In the high jump, George Berry of Cranbrook leaped 2 feet 6 inches, a quarter of an inch beneath Berry's own school record.

The outstanding individual performer of the day was Jim Hastings of Junior College, who took firsts in the javelin, discus, and shot to win high-point honors at the meet. Second to him was Keith Pattengill of Cranbrook, who had a total of 24 points, from firsts in the 100-yard dash and broad jump, third in the high hurdles and a place on the winning relay team.
