

SOFTBALL SEASON OPENS

Four Teams Win Openers To Gain Early League Lead

Eastern Michigan, Fintex-Fellowship, Birmingham Theater and Van's Pharmacy teams got off to an early start in the Y. M. C. A. softball league when the season opened with games Monday and Tuesday night.

The Birmingham Merchants, newly organized senior baseball team, broke even in two out-of-town games played during the week-end.

Although George O'Toole batted a steady gauge for Birmingham against the Grand Trunk nine on the State Hospital diamond in Fontaine Saturday, allowing eight hits, he received flattering support from his teammates at last night and lost, 4 to 3.

The winners scored all their runs in the fourth on a walk, two singles, three singles, a sacrifice and a triple. The Merchants, who collected only six hits off Cliff Kahne, Grand Trunk pitcher, rallied in the ninth, but fell one run short of tying the count.

The second game at Ortonville Sunday against the Ortonville Merchants was a different story. There the Birmingham team collected 18 safeties and took advantage of numerous Ortonville innuendoes to collect 15 to 4 wins. Haddock and Sykes starred at the bat for the winners.

The Merchants may open their home season with a game here Sunday afternoon, although Manager Leo Stiers said yesterday it was doubtful whether the new diamond on East Maple avenue at the Grand Trunk track would be completed by that time. If not, the first game here will be played the following Sunday, May 28, and the team will play one more game away from home in the meantime, Stiers said.

Board Seeks Loan On Bank Dividend

The Board of Education last Thursday night voted to negotiate for a loan of \$50,000, 75 percent of its deposit of \$33,000 in the First National Bank. The loan will be used to defray the current operating expenses which would be repaid out of the Board's first dividend from the bank, which Conservator Charles E. Jator has promised will be at least 15 percent. In addition to the 75 percent already paid after the first dividend, the Birmingham National Bank is repaid.

The Board also voted to redeem in serials about \$3,000 in bonds which failed to clear before the banking holiday, providing the holders agree to that method of settlement.

The new issue of scrip was made payable to all delinquent school taxes. The issue had previously been acceptable on only 1922 taxes. The two previous issues are also payable against school taxes of any year.

TELEGRAM SETTLES QUERIES ABOUT BEER

Various arguments and questions over interpretation of the state beer law leave the mere beer-drinker more or less bewildered as to what he can and cannot do in the way of purchasing and consuming the foamy beverage.

The following is a telegram sent recently by Frank G. Pfard, chairman of the Liquor Control Commission, to Oscar G. Olander, state police commissioner, a copy of which has been forwarded to Chief of Police John P. Harriott. It serves to clear up a few points that were hitherto undebated.

"Regulations passed by Commission prohibit sale of beer to anyone seated or standing in front of a counter or bar, regardless of whether these establishments in the same room or not," the telegram says.

"The word 'table' does not mean or include a bar or counter in the shape of a table. So-called 'one-seat' establishments may serve provided beer is conveyed to the consumer at the chair. This regulation has the force of law. Restaurants, clubs and gardens may sell for consumption on and off the premises. Drug stores, grocery stores and wholesalers may sell for consumption off the premises only and may sell one bottle at a time.

"This is also true of most stores that have received Secretary of State's approval by other retailer may sell at present. License must be prominently displayed and telegram sent by Commission sufficient."
