Blue And Grey Trackmen Take 10 First Places To Win, 72-23

The Cranbrook School track varsity scored its second victory in three starts against teams of college freshmen or junior college rank when it overcame the yearling cinder-men from Detroit City College by a score of 72 to 23 at Cranbrook Friday. The Blue and Grey trackmen started fast by scoring a sweep in the first event, the 150 yard high hurdles, and held their lead throughout by taking 10 out of 14 first places.

Although there was a light shower in the beginning of the meet, the sun soon warmed up the field, and the results for all events were fairly good.

Robert Eddy, Cranbrook's record-holder in the mile, won a close race in his first competition of the year. Eddy, who had trained only a week since leaving the ball team, was trailing Stern of the frosh until within about 15 yards of the tape. Here he almost doubled his speed in a terrific sprint and passed Stern easily.

In the 220, Andreae and Thompson took first and second for Cranbrook with times of 23.2 and 23.4 seconds, respectively, both under the previous field record. The school record, however, is 23 seconds, made last year on the Vps straightaway.

Carl Palmer Beaudette had a field-day in the weight events. He was entered in the shot-put, javelin, and discus, and took a first in three to rank as high-point man of the meet. His toss of 46 feet 1 inch in the shot put broke his own previous school record.

Andreae ranked second to Palmer Beaudette with 14 1/2 points, gathered from first places in the 120 high hurdles and the 220 dash, thirds in the shot, javelin, and broad-jump, and a place on the relay team.
