

GIRL, 3 YOUTHS HURT IN CRASH

Car Over-runs Pierce Street At Scene Of Former Wrecks

A 10-year-old girl was severely injured and three young men were lightly hurt when an auto was involved in a crash Sunday night which they were riding Sunday night plunged off the end of Pierce street and into a ditch at Turner's Mile road.

The girl was Lenora Wacker, 1828 Wood road, Beverly Hills, who is recovering in St. Joseph's Mercy hospital from a broken left leg and severe lacerations about the face.

The driver, Zelma Outland, 148 Central avenue, Centerline, Mich., was taken to the nose and suffered chest injuries. The other two youths, Floyd Fisher, 8315 Lane avenue, Detroit, and Joseph McDermott, 8599 Lane avenue, were cut and bruised.

The accident occurred at about 10 P. M. McDermott and Fisher were on a farm house at Thirteen Mile and Southfield roads where they called Dr. C. F. Lawler and the Kimball-Bailey ambulance from Birmingham, and were taken to the hospital after receiving first aid.

Outland and Miss Wacker were picked up in the meantime, by a passing motorist, who brought them to the office of Dr. O. O. Beck here. The girl was later transferred to the hospital, and Outland was taken home.

The place where the accident occurred has been the scene of several serious accidents, one of them being during the past two years.

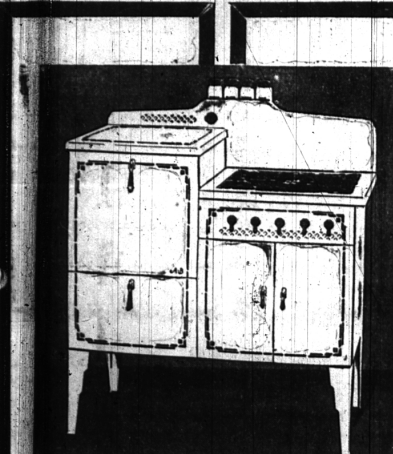
