**Avoiding The Rocks**

a slam; South, 4-Hearts, ending bidding.

The opening lead was East's fourth best spade, so that West could count the number of the suit held by the declarer. In view of South's bid of 2-Spades it would not have been surprising if East had led a diamond, instead of a spade. The diamond lead would have enabled West to lead a club if North had not let a return lead of clubs by West run to dummy's 8, so South's only chance of success would have been a trick. As it was, dummy's Ace won the opening lead of spades, and the declarer, who held the lowest club, expecting that he held no losers in diamonds, low trump was led from dummy. West's Ace won the trick.

West saw that his only hope of defeating the contract was to cause his partner to hold a club trick, and that East would then lead a diamond for West to win with his 2 of clubs, but the declarer went up with his Ace, then picked up West's Q hearts. West's 10 hearts and 9 clubs were then declarer led his Ace of diamonds, and West showed out. North spread his hand, and the declarer and giving opponents one diamond and one club trick.

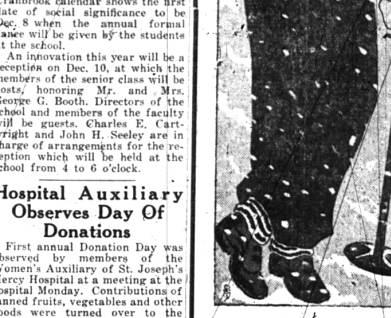
