Funeral Services Held Tuesday For Florence Hill of Delphian Study Club

Following an illness of five weeks, Mrs. Florence Elston Hill, 63 years old, died Saturday night at her home, 780 Oakland avenue. Services were held Tuesday afternoon from the S. D. Wylie Bell Home for Funerals, with interment in Evergreen Cemetery. The Rev. Dr. R. D. Hopkins, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated.

Mrs. Hill was the widow of William V. Hill, a public utilities manager and later a real estate dealer before his death in 1922, shortly after the family had moved to Detroit from Flint.

Mrs. Hill came to Birmingham 2 1/2 years ago, and for the past two years was president of the Delphian Study Club. She was born in Newark, N. J., moving here with her family when she was about 10 years old to Abie, Kan., then a frontier cattle town. She was married in Abie, and lived with her husband there and for several years in Chicago before moving to Flint.

She is survived by two sons, John E. of Barcelona, Spain, and Albert W. of Chicago. A daughter, Miss Ina H., also at home; and sisters, Jessie F. Elston of Saline, Kan. and Mrs. C. C. Fricke of Chicago.
