COMFORT AIDS HOME STUDY

Proper Lighting And Furniture Essential For Work After School

Home study is one of the relics of a harsher and less enlightened age in education. In many up-to-date school systems home study has long ago been abolished, but in others it is still condemned to pass his evening's laboring over school work that should have been looked behind him in the classroom or study hall.

In such cases parents should see that the home work is done under the best possible physical and mental conditions, so that it will result in the least harm to the child's health.

Among the items to be considered in providing proper conditions for home study are proper lighting, proper seating, ventilation of the room, and quiet. The home work should be illuminated by a bright light, preferably white, shining from the rear and slightly above the head of the child. If the material sets up a glare, he should wear an eye shade. The chair should be seated in a comfortable chair with a straight back so that he will not be tempted to slouch down or sit in a position which is bad for his health. He should be encouraged to sit up straight.

If the home work consists of reading a book, the book should be held in the hand, rather than placed upon a table, and the printed page should be 12 to 14 inches from the eyes.

If a table is used, the table and chair should be so adjusted in height that the child will not need to bend over his work or to hunch his shoulders. His feet should touch the floor. If the chairs available in the home are too tall for this, a thick book may be placed at his feet for a foot-rest.

Visitor Succumbs At Son's Home Here
 Pneumonia Proves Fatal To Former Postmaster of Norway, Mich.

Stricken with pneumonia while on a visit here, Samuel Perkins, 68 years old, of Norway, Mich., died Sunday afternoon at the home of his son, Harold G. Perkins, 379 Aspen road, with whom he had been spending the past three weeks.

The body was sent Monday to Norway, where services were held Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Perkins had been in the general merchandising business in Norway for 50 years, and postmaster for 12 years, retiring last April. He was secretary of the Norway Board of Education and for 40 years was superintendent of the Norway Methodist Sunday School.

He was a past master of the Norway Masonic Lodge, and was a member of the Marquette Shrine, and of the Knight Templars of Marquette. Masonic rites were held at his home.

Mr. Perkins was born in Cornwall, Eng., coming to the United States with his family when he was two years old.

Surviving, besides the son here, are two other sons, Willard S. and J. Russell, both of Detroit; and five sisters, Mrs. Mary Trezona and Miss Essie Perkins, both of Norway, Mrs. Emma Hendu of Noranda, Quebec, Mrs. Amelia Cutler of Denver, Col., and Mrs. Rose Tillinghast, of Carson Lake, Minn.
