Tax Hunger

"People who pay taxes must learn the fact that the people who spend the taxes do not get or cultivate the viewpoint of the people who are called upon to pay these taxes. Therefore, whether the tax is in the name of so-called public service, or for more practical patronage purposes, those elected to offices that spend the tax money are perpetually getting hungrier for more and greater taxes."

"Perhaps this is a natural direction for those who spend the taxes. To the extent that it is natural, it is to be sympathized with. But the burden in Michigan has grown to such gigantic proportions in the last 10 years that it is a perfectly plain matter of record that the people cannot meet the debt charge for carrying on what is called government."

"The public has become too irresponsible toward the duties of citizenship, and even when serious infringement of government is called to their attention they too often laugh it off. Men in public office often have committed violations of the law—some of them highly serious yet when the public is informed of the charge they do little about it. In Iron County, where I live, a taxpayers' association with which I am connected was able to have a township supervisor removed by former Governor Brucker, for erroneous conduct. Yet the next spring the voters in that township reelected him to office."

Cities School Costs

"The people who pay the taxes can, if they wish, reduce their taxes by setting up non-political machinery which will hold to account every public official who spends the taxes raised by the various governmental units. We should have much better government for much less money."

"The increased cost of public schools is a sample of the manner in which your tax rate goes up, for those who determine your school budgets are those who spend them—and they cannot possibly obtain the taxpayers' viewpoint. The net result is that, in the name of education for our children, many sins are committed upon the taxpayers' purses."

"Personally, I favor the state setting up a standard curriculum of education, so that every boy and girl, regardless of condition of wealth, will receive a certain degree of schooling. Then I would allow the various school districts to add to this standard curriculum whatever they, individually, wish and can pay for."

Mr. Conlin, discussing reforms in township and county government, favored the continuation of them as units, but would abolish nearly all the excess offices, the non-support. He proposed that the township maintain only a supervisor, who would represent the state and county in the township.

Mr. Conlin also held that a sheriff should be used only as a jailer, and that the state should control all policing outside of corporate areas. He believes that the county treasurer should handle all levying and collecting of taxes, and that each county should have the right to set up its own governmental reforms under a Home Rule Act.
