All Garments To Be Placed On Exhibition For The Public Organization Adds 245 New Members And 12 Directors In Year

The anniversary celebration will consist of an exhibit of all the garments contributed by the local membership. The exhibit will be open to the public from noon through the remainder of the day.

Since its organization here a year ago, the Guild has added 245 new members and 12 new directors to its roster. All New Garments The history of the Guild dates back to the days when groups of women met to sew garments for charity. The modern requirement for membership, however, is that each woman joining must pledge to contribute two new garments to the annual in-gathering. New garments only are accepted, not only for the sake of longer wear and durability, but also to encourage self-respect in the individual who receives them. In the past, before the in-gathering each year, both the old and new members turn in their contributions in respective drawers. To become a director, one must enroll 10 new "gathering members" and be responsible for 22 garments in addition to a sum of money. At the in-gathering a year ago, the \$60 received from the sale of garments has been on exhibition at the Community House Tuesday. They will be distributed through the welfare department of the House. At the in-gathering a year ago, 1,130 new garments of men's women's and children's clothing were collected.

Contract Bridge

By E. V. SHEPARD MAJORS BRIDGE TEACHER CAN TWO SPADE LEADS BEST WEST? clearer cannot trump his losing club, nor can he establish dummy's hearts by leading them and then later using them. East can, however, cover South's diamonds with seven trump leads. At the end of those leads the declarer will hold only the A and K of clubs. Dummy will hold just the A-Q of hearts. North will have a possible trick, though he will win two hearts or the declarer will lose a trick. North will win a club in his own hand and a heart with dummy. The declarer will lose 5-odd. If South leads a trump, instead of a club, after his heart, he will have the two black Aces, West will have the same squeeze, by leading one every trick.

Next try the only possible remaining method of defeating a contract of 3 through South. Lead a club from dummy. Suppose that South wins the trick with his A of clubs. He leads the A of clubs.
