**CRANBROOK WINS Baldwin, St. Clair Teams Battle To Scoreless Tie**

Defeated Cleveland University School, 3 to 2, in Second Overtime Period

The Cranbrook Soccer team closed its 1933 season Saturday with a 3 to 2 victory over Cleveland University School in a thrilling tilt at Cranbrook which went into two overtime periods.

The victory gave the Cranes a record of two wins and five losses for the season.

The game opened with Cranbrook bombarding Mitchell, the Cleveland goalie, with a bevy of swift shots, and with Mitchell making some phenomenal saves.

In the closing minutes of the first period, Captain Anderson of Cranbrook dropped a beautiful corner kick in front of the Cleveland goal, and Ralph McDonnell, center forward, headed it in.

The next score came in the first minute of the third period, when Bohannon, Cleveland captain, dribbled through the entire Cranbrook backfield and sank a goal from close range. McDonnell scored Cranbrook's second goal in the fourth period, after an extended pass, Thompson to Anderson to Seely, had put the ball in front of the goal.

With the game nearly over, Cleveland of University School kicked the score, following a penalty kick by Bohannon.

The first overtime period expired without a score, but in the second Cranbrook put in the deciding goal, McDonnell scoring on a pass from McKinley.

**CLEVELANDERS UPSET CRANES**

**45-Yard Pass in Closing Period Wins For Visitors, 12 to 6**

Although it outplayed its opponent, the Cranbrook Soccer football team lost to Cleveland University School eleven Saturday afternoon at Cranbrook, 12 to 6.

The visitors opened the scoring towards the end of the first quarter when Tommy Adams, their lead-end passing wonder, tossed a 45-yard pass to Dick Hauserman, right end, which was good to Cranbrook's five-yard line. On the next play, Ed Seick Gascoigne pushed the ball over for a touchdown.

Earlier in the same period, the Clevelanders made a drive down the field and over the goal line, only to have the touchdown fumble which was recovered by Cranbrook for a touchback. A fumble also cost Cranbrook a chance to score in the second quarter after Demrick, Cranbrook captain and right tackle, blocked a punt in Cleveland territory.

**Pass Helps Cranes**

Against the Cranes in the third stanza, when Cleveland spoiled their hopes again of scoring a touchdown by recovering a ball pass from center with the ball in Cranbrook's possession on the visitors' five-yard mark.

Later in the same period, however, James of Cranbrook threw a 30-yard pass to Bob Eddy, putting the ball on Cleveland's 10-yard line, after a series of line smashes, Blake carried it over the goal line on a quarterback sneak, tying the score at 6 to 6.

With the game nearly over, Tommy Adams of Cleveland stood on the 60-yard line, paused a moment, and hurled a perfect 47-yard pass to Hauserman. The ball nearly bounded from his hands, but he finally got a firm grip on it and sprinted the remaining five yards for the deciding touchdown.

**Season Ends**

The game ended for Cranbrook a season in which it scored three victories and was defeated four times. It won against Jackson Junior College, Detroit City College, Freshmen and Howe Military Academy, and was beaten by Nichols Academy, Central State Teachers' College Freshmen and Cleveland University School.

**Baldwin, St. Clair Teams Battle To Scoreless Tie**

Both Elevens Threaten Enemy Goal Lines, But Lack Touchdown Punch

A hard playing team from St. Clair had a Maroon and White gridder of Baldwin High School to a scoreless tie Saturday afternoon on Pierce Field. The result left the Maples with a record of five victories, one defeat and one tie, with Royal Oak still to be played.

Each team had one splendid opportunity to score, but each lacked the touch punch to put over a touchdown. In the first period after Edgett, St. Clair's star halfback had toted the ball for two yards and placed it on Birmingham's 10-yard mark, the visitors were unable to advance it more than four yards farther, and finally lost it on downs.

Baldwin's chance came in the second period after Guckelberg had gotten off his best punt in the year. He heeded the pugin from the side of the 57-line to the east outside on St. Clair's two-yard mark. On first down, Edgett Guckelberg caught it on the enemy's 17-yard line and carried it to 10 before being downed.

**Fumble Is Recovered**

Birmingham fans groaned when Edgett fumbled the ball on the seven-yard mark on the next play. It rolled several feet, but was finally recovered by Guckelberg. The recovery meant that he rolled the ball on downs, and Edgett kicked out of danger.

The Maroon opened the third quarter with a drive which again gave promise of a score. Following the first down, a long pass was called from Boynton to Schwarze. This play has been used as a touchdown play, but this far has never been successful.

This time, with Boynton tossing from St. Clair's 25-yard stripe, the Baldwin quarterback caught the latter was standing over the goal line. For a moment it appeared the Baldwin quarterback would snare it, but after juggling it a second, his fingers, numbed by the cold, dropped it, and visions of a touchdown shimmering.

**Good Interference**

Some line interference on the part of the St. Clair players saved the way for several gains of 10 to 15 yards in the last period, but always before the ball was pulled on the threshold of the scoring zone. St. Clair also intercepted two Maroon passes in the quarter, but both catches were made near mid-field and proved of little value.

Guckelberg ripped off the longest run of the game in the closing minutes of play after catching a St. Clair punt on his own 10-yard line, he twisted and dodged his way through a host of would-be tacklers to his 40-yard mark.
