2 GAVIGTERS FOUND SLAIN

John Strong had been received here of the death in Roseville, Cal., of John Strong, 64 years old, a native of Big Beaver and a brother of William Strong of Crooks road. An invalid for about four years, Mr. Strong died Thursday as the result of a fall suffered three weeks before at Big Beaver on Aug. 19, 1929. He spent his boyhood there and became well known in Birmingham. A railroad brakeman by trade, he was employed by the Michigan Central Railroad before moving to California, where he had been in the employ of the Southern Pacific for about 30 years before his death.

He was a member of the F. and A. M. Lodge, Knights Templar, and Shrine, all of Sacramento, Cal., and of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Lela Wood of Roseville, and three brothers, William, Sidney of Big Beaver, and Harry of Detroit. A fourth brother, Isaac, of Peley, died three weeks ago.

Funeral services were held in Roseville Saturday. The remains were cremated and sent here in the family lot in Crooks Cemetery.

Sarah Jane Badger, mother of Dr. Banks B. Duncan, formerly a resident of Beverly Hills, died early Saturday morning at her home, 227 West Leland boulevard, Detroit. Services were held from the residence at 2 P. M. Monday by burial in Woodmere Cemetery.

Surviving, besides Dr. Duncan, are two other sons, Dr. James L. Duncan, with whom she lived, and L. I. Duncan, of Kansas City, Mo. Burial was held in Woodmere Cemetery.

Anti-Tuberculosis War Is Described

Theodore J. Werle, executive secretary of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association, addressed Birmingham Rotarians at the Community House Monday noon, explaining the work of modern medicine and surgery to combat the "white plague." His talk, illustrated with X-ray pictures, revealed the progress that surgery has come to play in aiding those afflicted with the dread disease.

He pointed out that in 1882 a German discovered what he termed the "germ parasite" of tuberculosis, but that to date no specific medicinal curative serums have been developed. Instead, modern surgeons are using a technique of collapsing the afflicted portions of the lungs by surgical methods, a system that is gaining great headway through the country.

"Combating tuberculosis requires the co-operative aid of both the medical and surgical sciences, and the public," stated Mr. Werle. "This latter phase of the work is carried on by the purchase, each year, of Christmas Seals. These funds are then used to educate the public as to the best medical and surgical means to successfully combat the disease."

Mr. Werle is scheduled to address the Lions Club Wednesday noon.

Both men had been arrested several times on almost every criminal charge, but neither had been often convicted. During the last year before their deaths they had been in hiding after jumping \$1,000 bonds while awaiting trial under the Public Enemy Act.
