School For Children To Open In Franklin

With classes for children from three to nine years of age, the Kathryn Millard Stringer School, located at Co. Columbus road, near Monday on Franklin road, near Northwestern highway, in Franklin, Mich., will open Monday.

Mrs. Stringer, the director, is a graduate of the University of Michigan, and has taken post-graduate work at Co. Columbus road. She was a teacher in the public schools for several years.

passion and understanding that was able to accept Simon Peter's human frailties and bring to Peter's mind the vision of man's true possibilities.

"Jesus knew of Peter's shortcomings, of course; but he did not remind him of them and limit Peter's capacities for good. No. Rather, Jesus said to Peter: 'You are a rock upon this rock I will build my church.' And Peter, glimpsing Jesus' vision, warmed by Jesus' enthusiasm and crusading spirit, thereupon walked valiantly toward the goal of martyrdom that was clearly the lot of a man of God.

Avoid Scolding
 "There is something wrong with a religion that doesn't urge youth to go forward, as Jesus did with Peter, and cause youth to be willing to die, if need be, so that righteousness will triumph. The world must learn that, if it would go forward spiritually, it must get the proper kind of religious impulse. We must not scold people who must, if they cannot scold people into better behavior. We must not be suspicious of people so much, for experience proves that too much suspicion of people generally drives them in the direction of your suspicions.

"Don't tell a problem-boy that he is headed for a prison or a reformatory; don't paint him a terrible picture of his destination. Instead, resort to a positive suggestion of good and urge him toward those goals that are the reward of good behavior.

"I like the thoughts of Mary Pickford, the great actress, on this subject. Recently she said: 'What one thinks goes over faster than what one says or does. To think of religion as an attitude of mind, a way of living, makes it real and practical. Living divinely is quite simple if we will only uncommodify ourselves and think of good as another name for God. This makes God near and available every day, instead of something hazy, vague, and far off.'

Positive Vision Needed
 "If I say to you men in these service clubs: you are the rock upon which the home, the school, the government, the church, the family, the industry, the very morals of civilization, are built, experience has proven that you will strive better to build stronger within yourselves those qualities which bring about such progress.

"If I tell you that you men are the rocks—just as Jesus told Simon Peter that the Christian Church was to be built—if I tell you in this positive way that you can bring about good health, opportunities for all, optimism, self-improvement, and many other things of beauty, you will be willing to die the death of a martyr, as did Peter, to attain them. Today, more than ever, we need the positive vision of Christianity's promise to mankind. Let us be less critical and more constructive."

Preceding Mr. Aulenbach's address, Harry McDonald, of Detroit, assisted by Fred Butterfield, of radio station WJR, sang several baritone solos and received appreciative applause.

Obituary

ISAAC STRONG

Funeral services were held in Potosky Tuesday afternoon for Isaac Strong, former resident of Birmingham and Big Beaver, who died Sunday morning in a Potosky hospital following an operation. He was 77 years old, and had been in poor health for several years.

Mr. Strong was a carpenter and contractor by trade. He supervised the construction of the City Hall, of several large hotels, and of numerous power plants on Watson Lake. He lived in Big Beaver as a boy, and made his home in Birmingham for about 10 years, following about 30 years ago to Potosky where he has resided ever since.

He is survived by four brothers, William of Crooks road, Sidney of Big Beaver, Harry of Detroit, and John M. of Nevada City, Cal. A wife and daughter preceded him in death in Potosky.
