HILLS TO DEFEND ANTI-SIGN RULING

Bloomfield Commission Decides To Answer Suit For Bill-Board Maintenance

The Bloomfield Hills Commission voted last night to defend in court its right to legislate against the erection of signs and bill-boards within the city limits.

The decision was made in answer to a suit filed Monday in Circuit Court asking for an injunction to restrain the city from interfering with the maintenance of signs erected by the Wolverine Sign Works on the property of Mrs. Ellen C. Benedict and Miss Clara Benedict on Woodward

An order to show cause why a temporary injunction should not be issued is returnable Monday, and Commissioner Frank W. Atkinson, city attorney, was instructed to fight the case.

The sign company made a contract with the Benedicts in 1927 for the erection of four signs on their property. The contract runs for 10 years, with a 10-year renewable clause.

Charles J. Shain, druggist, member of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors: "I don't believe a resolution asking the Governor to call a special session of the Legislature to provide school relief was the proper thing for consideration by the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, which can't balance its own budget."

Mr. Fry, in whose paying state funds are placed, told the delegation that "you may rest assured that all school money that comes to my office will be used for schools only, and not diverted or borrowed for some other state needs."

The committee distributed through the schools 2,500 stamped postal cards bearing petitions to the Governor, asking him to provide for school relief legislation in his special session call, and declaring that without state aid the Birmingham schools will be forced to close in January.

Trustees Protest Teachers' Salary Check Deductions

Should deductions be made in checking teachers' salary checks for dues in organizations, group insurance payments, extension course fees, and the like, either voluntarily or involuntarily, or should the salary be paid in full and the individual teacher be held responsible for making his or her own "deductions"?

This question was raised at a meeting of the Board of Education last Thursday night, but instead of developing into an argument it first promised to do, faded out into a series of embarrassing prolonged periods of silence among members of the Board.

But this Mr. Potter refused to do, and the issue was not brought to a head except in a motion which failed to find a second, and in a suggestion which did not even receive the form of a motion.

The discussion centered around deductions of \$2.50 made recently in the pay checks of all teachers enrolled in a course being offered here by the extension division of the University of Michigan.

More than 70 teachers signed up for the course on an enrollment sheet passed around by Superintendent Charles J. Cranley with the understanding that the tuition fee would be deducted from their salaries in quarterly instalments each semester.

SCHOOL ELECTIONS To Be Held In June

Birmingham School Board elections hereafter will be held on the second Monday in June instead of the second Monday in July. A resolution to this effect was adopted at the annual school district election last July, but was not formally approved by the Board of Education until last Thursday night.

TEACHERS' SICK LEAVE REDUCED TO FIVE DAYS

Birmingham school teachers will be allowed only five days of absence for sickness, with pay, this year instead of seven, the Board of Education decided last Thursday night. The reduction was made because of the smaller appropriation for supply teachers, only \$450 being provided in the 1933-34 budget for this purpose.

BOARD REFUSED LOAN AGAINST BANK DEPOSIT

The application of the Birmingham school district for a loan of \$1,400 against its impounded deposit in the First National Bank here has been refused, it was announced yesterday by Louis M. Randall, business manager of the schools.

The Board of Education had applied for a portion of the \$1,400 impounded amount by the state for loans to school districts, with impounded bank deposits, but has refused on the grounds that the bank here has paid a "substantial" dividend, Mr. Randall said. The deposit in the bank, totals approximately \$45,000. The bank has paid a 25 per cent dividend.
