CHRY TO JOIN IN NAVY DAY

Birmingham's Part in National Observance Will Be Simple

Friday will be Navy Day in Birmingham, as well as in other cities and villages throughout the nation. James W. Taylor, associate justice of the Municipal Court, therefore has appointed chairman of the local branch of the national observance, has named Col. William B. Roosevelt, Jr., of Well-eley drive, as his assistant in charge of the program.

The observance here will be simple. Colonel Roosevelt said, consisting only of the display of flags by the merchants Friday, and reading of a Navy Day pamphlet at next week's meetings of the three men's service clubs.

In connection with the observance here, Mr. Taylor issued the following statement:

"Navy Day this year is Oct. 27. In accordance with a long established custom, all persons interested in national defense, which means all good citizens, will take the occasion to inform one another in regard to the Navy, the first line of defense.

"The navy, as a part of our National Defense, is indisputably an absolutely essential function of the Federal Government, should therefore be maintained at a safe strength, regardless of changing administrations, or economic conditions, or attacks of political portents which would advance any lad of the moment to the detriment of things more vital.

"Not of the various veteran organizations, together with all other organizations and individuals who are informed as to the national defense, insist without compromise that our navy should be maintained at the strength, in all details, that is stipulated in the present-day, existing treaty, between the nations, on naval armaments. The United States took the lead in the enactment of the naval treaty, we reduced our navy to a minimum in order to encourage disarmament among other nations, below this minimum we can not go. President Roosevelt has, some time ago, authorized the construction of cruisers and other elements of the navy, to offset the neglect of the past few years, to bring the navy to the minimum strength required by ordinary prudence.

"In the event of the national defense invites attack by aggressive nations who seek more territory. Such neglect, too, prejudices the lives of our own sons, who would be called to the colors in case of war.

"Merchants, public buildings and citizens are urged to display the national flag on Oct. 27 as a salute to the United States Navy."

Our authority for this is Jane Manner, who has devoted her life to the study of the voice and the teaching of her findings to wives and husbands, speechists, business and professional men and women, stenographers, shopgirls, stage and motion picture stars and radio people.

Some Pupils
She has trained such actresses as Vilma Banky, the Hungarian star, for the talkies; Adrienne Ames, another picture star; Muriel Kirkland, Wren Connolly and many others of the legitimate stage; Porter Hall, of radio fame, and countless Park avenue residents, clubwomen and figures in the business and professional world.

"I get an equal number of people from every walk of life, who feel that their voice is a handicap. I even get young girls, who have their heart set on winning the affection of a young man. They are conscious that their voice is irritating, that they are unable to express themselves in speech adequately and seek to remove it. Many romances have been consummated through my work with the voices of young swains or bashful maidens."

Common Speech Crimes
An unpleasant voice or lip-laziness grates on one's nerves many times, when the actual irritant is not evident. A well-bred woman will take exception to "Wenji want me to come?" or "Watchu wanna do to-night?" from her husband, who is supposed to rank high in the business world. Yet, according to Miss Manner, "watchu," "wenjus," "gonnas" and many other speech crimes are common to Miss Manner's class.

Miss Manner is a very business-like like in appearance. If you were to listen in on a lesson in her studio you would hear a lot of "toh-toh-tohs" and "faw-faw-faws," but it is surprising what a change it all makes.

Cure for Bashfulness
Learning the proper use of the voice is a correct speech opens wide avenues to success for many people. Miss Manner states: "Many backward folks blossom out, shed their bashfulness and nervousness when they master their voice. It's the key to human relations, she says, the bridge over which people must cross in human intercourse.

An interesting sidelight on Miss Manner's work, is the fact that she has been doing much of her work this year by lecture. People who haven't the funds to pay for instruction have offered services or money of their own. A dentist cared for the instructor's teeth in exchange for lessons. A milliner, who felt that she was not equal to her patronage in speech, has made her hats.

Tuition Security Reduced By Board
Amendment Makes Bonds-Fore-Taxes Plan Possible in Bloomfield District No. 5

An action of the Birmingham Board of Education last Thursday night made it possible for School District No. 5, Bloomfield Township (Bloomfield Village Subdivision), to authorize the payment of its delinquent 1932 school taxes in bonds of the district.

Owing \$27,725 to the Birmingham district for tuition, the Bloomfield district had pledged 40 per cent of all its delinquent taxes as security for the debt. At the suggestion of Cutler, Moeller and Hubble, a firm authorized to deposit Birmingham school bonds with the treasurer in payment of taxes, the amount of this security was reduced to 20 per cent in order that the Bloomfield district might adopt the bonds-for-taxes plan for 1932 delinquent tax payments, 20 per cent of the payments to be made in cash and 80 per cent in bonds.

Members of the School Board agreed this arrangement might stimulate tax payments and thus serve to reduce the tuition debt even more rapidly than would be the case with the larger security.

An application from the Michigan Tax Adjustment Bureau for permission to deal in Birmingham school bonds under the bonds-for-taxes plan was again tabled. The application had been pending two weeks before by J. D. Stanley, secretary of the bureau, but action was deferred to the drafting of a suitable resolution.

TWO POCKETBOOKS STOLEN FROM CHURCH
Two women's pocketbooks were stolen from a room in the First Methodist Church Tuesday night while their owners were attending a meeting in an adjoining room, it was reported to police. The pocketbooks had been left near a window where they could be easily reached from the outside, police said.
