DR. CHARLES P. STEWART
ARE LEGION
Ban On Cigaretts Among Panaceas Offered At Convention

WASHINGTON.—The recent anti-crime conference in Washington brought to light a long list of suggestions, which the press as yet has not adequately "featured," for ending the national wave of lawlessness. For example, Dr. Charles C. Pease of New York assured the delegates that only absolute prohibition of cigarettes can reform the country.

Gen. Amos A. Fries' solution of the problem calls for suppression of communism and defeat of the anti-child labor amendment to the Federal Constitution.

Lieut. Richmond Pearson Hobson's program requires the creation of "a federal department of applied education," with bureaus to:
1. Account for and end law violation.
2. Deal with drug addiction, alcoholism and social disease.
3. End economic abuses.
4. Evolve a perfect type of Americanism.
Starting Early Executive Secretary Beasie Locke of the National Kindergarten Association pointed out to the convention that children "go wrong" simply because they are not "taken in hand" early enough; they would continue through life in the right direction if under experienced professional control from 3 years old, or 4, at the latest.

The entire convention was impressed by Attorney General Homer S. Cummings' assurance that Alcatraz Island, in San Francisco Bay, is about to be transformed into a "Devil's Isle" for irreclaimable federal prisoners, and that Harvey L. Bailey is to be sent there, where he cannot contaminate relatively decent captives.

No attention whatever was paid to the statement by Special Assistant Attorney General Joseph B. Keenan, who prosecuted and convicted Bailey, that the latter, as outlaws go, is a "pretty good chap," who probably never would seriously have erected "but for prohibition" and still appears to have "kindly instincts."

Internationally famous explorers and a noted cowboy singer are scheduled to appear at the Detroit Institute of Arts in four Sunday afternoon lectures in November. BAKED CALF'S LIVER
Calf's liver, 2 lb. beef or poultry fat, 2 onions sliced, 2 tb. flour, salt and pepper.
Wash, trim and skin calf's liver, sprinkle all over with salt, pepper and flour and place in a spider with the fat and onions. Melt fat and spread over top of liver. Cover spider closely and place in a hot oven 15 minutes. Uncover, reduce heat, and bake slowly until tender and nicely browned (about 1 hour). Serve with slices of fried bacon.
