#### MAKING A FINESSE SAFE

ESPECIALLY in no rump, the success or failure of a contract often depends upon the outcome of a finesse. When a finesse may be taken either way it should be taken toward the adversary of which the declarer is the less afraid. The declarer of the hand today had such a problem to solve:

Bidding went: South, 1-Dimond; North, 2-Notrump; South, 2 stops to hearts coming up to him, and considerable strength in his hand, won from their temporary hearts: North, 3-No Trumps, as his side was not vulnerable and because West, who was not vulnerable, appeared to be trying to save game at comparatively small loss. The contract was made without even a dot-ace.

The opening lead was the 4 of clubs, and West, who had never learned to lead to an honor just because he had 3 of them, led to East's Q, which was held by holding a forcing card to dialogue one of declarer's stops to a minimum.

There was no certainty that West
