BOYS GROUPS BEING FORMED

Educational, Recreational Program To Begin About Nov. 1

Eight groups of boys of grade school and junior high school age will begin regular meetings for educational and recreational purposes about Nov. 1 under the auspices of the Birmingham Y. M. C. A. This has been announced by Robert D. Lynd, Y. M. C. A. secretary. The boy-group program is sponsored by the Y. M. C. A. here each year.

As in past years, the meetings will be held in various school buildings. Mr. Lynd said. Two groups will meet every Monday night at Adams School, four groups, including two from Pierce School, will meet every Tuesday night at Barnhill School, and two more groups will meet weekly at the Tuesday night at Quanton School. The H. Y. Club, for senior high school boys, is already meeting every Wednesday night in the Community House.

The first part of each meeting will begin at 7 P. M. and continue for approximately an hour and a half, Mr. Lynd said. The first part of each meeting will be given over to educational pursuits, including Bible study. The boys will be grouped by the adult leaders or by outsiders. The last half of each meeting will be devoted to work in the gymnasiums.

Any boy is eligible to join the groups. The boys will be grouped from each school according to age. Adult leaders already chosen to supervise the work include Eugene Hubbard, Maurice Geisel, Leonard McClure, George Winborn and the most recently, Mr. Lynd said, to be chosen later, Mr. Lynd said. The leaders will meet for a training conference at the Y. M. C. A. new headquarters in the Community House Monday evening.

Mr. Lynd also announced tentative plans for a "Saturday Morning Club" for boys of from about 10 to 14 years of age. The club plans materialize, he said, the activity of this organization will also begin about Nov. 1.

The plans call for the club to meet every Saturday morning, probably at the Community House for hikes, camping trips, and indoor games when the weather is unfavorable. A stamp club also will be developed. All activities of the organization would be supervised by adult leaders.

"OPEN HOUSE" SERIES PLANNED FOR YOUTH

The first of a series of Sunday afternoon "Open House" programs for young people at the First Baptist Church will be held Sunday afternoon at 5:30 P. M. All young men and women over 15 years old are welcome to attend.

Each "Open House" will occupy two hours, comprising a social hour at the beginning, a period of group singing, reading, special music, brief devotionals, a talk, debate, radio, games and refreshments. Dr. Allyn King, pastor of Chicago, a member of the Board of Christian Education, will address the first gathering Sunday.

Officers of the Baptist Youth League are in charge of the program: chairman, Frank Boyes, president; Louise Curry, program chairman; Marjorie Can-Harris, luncheon chairman, and Reynolds Griffin, publicity chairman.
