Maple Reserves Openers, 13 To 6

But Baldwin Team Fails To Improve In Win Over Hazel Park

Baldwin High School gridder made a successful but unimpressive 1933 debut Friday afternoon in Hazel Park, when they defeated the Hazel Park team 13 to 6.

A strong defense and some excellent running on the part of Baldwin, Park captain and fullback, led the Maple reserves in two of the four periods, and kept the ball out of Hazel Park's danger zone a good deal of the time.

The Baldwin line, which had been considered the weak part of the team, help up surprisingly well, especially on offense. When Maroon fullback was halted at the line, it was largely due to the slow start of the carrier and not to the inability of the forwards to open holes.

Line's Defense

The line's defensive play was not nearly on a par with its offensive performance, however. Baldwin fullback was slow to break at the line, the Hazel Park wall when the Parkers were carrying the ball.

The first Maple score came as the result of a bad pass from center on the part of Scott, the Park pivot man, late in the first half. On a punt formation, Scott passed to the ball over the kicker's head and it rolled 20 yards, combed at rest on the Maroon 14-yard line, where it was recovered by one of the Maple elevators.

On Second Down, Freddy

Schwartz, Baldwin quarterback, carried 2 passes to Fred Boynton at left end. Boynton muffed the ball on the four-yard mark and crossed the
