

## Tag Sale Here Nets \$426 For Hospital Clinic Fund

As a result of the tag sale conducted in Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills Saturday by members of the Junior Auxiliary of St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, a sum of \$426.87 was raised for the hospital clinic fund, according to Mrs. Carlsson Fox, chairman of the sale.

Of this amount, Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills Schools contributed \$30, representing donations of \$7.65 from Adams School, \$4.23 from Baldwin High School, \$1.27 from Barnum School, \$3.07 from Brookside School, \$1.20 from the Holy Name Parochial School, 65 cents from Bloomfield School District No. 2, 80 cents from Pierce School, \$4.35 from the Bloomfield Hills Elementary School, and \$6.41 from Quanton School. Mrs. Karl Rickerson and Mrs. Jack Storm were in charge of contributions in the schools.

Among individual donations received were \$50 from Senator and Mrs. James Cousins, \$10 from Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Seaholm, and \$5 from Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Winningham.

A sum of \$178.68 was turned in to the committee by Mrs. Joan E. Maxham, captain of the group selling tags from 8 A. M. until noon. Mrs. Carl Darmstatter, captain of a group selling from noon until 3 P. M., received \$56.21. The group working with Mrs. Frank Cousins, as captain, from 3 P. M. until 6 P. M., turned over \$145.77, and the last group, on duty from 6 to 9 P. M. with Mrs. J. S. Colgrove and Miss Harriet Flannery as captains, received \$46.91.

The money will be used for the maintenance of the clinic, and for the purchase of medical, dental and surgical supplies for both adults and children.

Mrs. Charles H. Benning of Royal Oak, chairman for the county, announced that the total amount raised to date through sales here and elsewhere in the county exceeds \$1,000. Sales will be conducted Saturday in Pontiac, Milford and Commerce Townships, Mrs. Benning said.

(Continued from Page 1, Part 2) 30 hours every other week, for which their pay is \$10.50, distributed in weekly installments of \$3.25 each. This sum is distributed to them in cash, instead of being applied to their credit for groceries furnished by the city.

The system enables the welfare subject to purchase necessities he would not otherwise be able to buy, and gives him an increased measure of independence, Mr. Van Camp said, adding that only certain cases are selected under this method.

### Resolution Appeals For Arms Reduction

Women's Literary Club To Send  
Plea To Geneva Conference

A resolution asking for the reduction and limitation of armaments, to be submitted to the General Disarmament Conference at Geneva was introduced at a meeting of the Women's Literary Club Tuesday by Mrs. Charles J. Shain. The resolution was approved by the organization, and will be sent to the Conference by vote of the members.

"The resolution states that 'The Birmingham Women's Literary Club believes it imperative that the General Disarmament Conference complete as speedily as possible, a treaty providing for the reduction and limitation of armaments, thereby lessening the possibility of war, and decreasing the great burden of military expenditures.'

"At this time internal distrust has been increased and the development of material armament has been stimulated in the United States and elsewhere. The present dangerous situation can be checked only by the success of the Disarmament Conference. There is, however, little prospect of agreement unless public opinion renews its insistence on genuine disarmament."

"In urging action by the Disarmament Conference, the Birmingham Women's Literary Club is reasserting its corporate belief, held since 1920, that war must be prevented by international cooperation. For 12 years the Federation of Women's Clubs has studied the question of disarmament and has urged effective action at the Washington Conference of 1921, the Geneva Conference of 1927, and the London Conference of 1930.

"To hold the gains made during this period, it must now be consolidated and further advance must be made by the wide world acceptance of a comprehensive and effective plan for general disarmament."
