George Bakken, 18 years old, of Greenwood, Minn., was seriously injured Sunday night when his body struck a raised concrete piling platform at the Grand trunk Railroad station after he had jumped on a freight train. Bakken, with a companion, Alvin Vashaw, 21, was returning to Minnesota after a visit with Vashaw's uncle, Ralph Vashaw, 2210 Broadway road, Royal Oak. The boys had come here in a futile search for work. Vashaw was also caught between the train and the platform, and was uninjured. Bakken received a serious leg injury and lacerations. He was removed to the Royal Oak Private Hospital.

**PARENTS MUST AID IN HEALTH**  
Schools Not Solely Responsible For Teaching Rules Of Hygiene

Thousands of children throughout our country are returning to school this month, to take up tasks which they left off last spring, or began the long and necessary school life that will give them the opportunity to receive the education which will produce that true growth, mental and physical, which is the good of education. Since the foundation of the Republic, the necessity and importance of public education has been realized. More recently we have begun to recognize that health is one of the cardinal objectives of education. Education without health is unsafe. Not only must the school child be protected from ill health which might result from confinement in school so many hours a day, he must also be taught the lessons of health so that his body will grow stronger and more resistant to disease as a result of his school experience. To further this aim, many up-to-date school systems have departments of physical and health instruction, and virtually every state educational system has a supervisor of health education to work with teachers in watching over the health of school children. It is important, of course, that of the school's field as any other. Health teaching is as much a part of the school's field as any other kind of teaching. But the responsibility does not rest wholly upon the school. Parents must also help. In this field parents have a special opportunity to aid in bringing up their children to be healthy. How can parents help? They must first learn the fundamentals of health for themselves and practice them in the home. This is the first of a series of articles on the health of school children prepared for The Eccentric. In her next article, Miss McCormick will state the fundamental rules of good health.

**Boy Auto Thieves In Probate Court**  
Two Of Berkeley Ring Released, Two Others Held For Further Investigation  
Two members of a ring of five Berkeley boys who admitted stealing more than a score of automobiles within a few weeks in Birmingham, Pontiac, Royal Oak and Detroit, were held for further investigation, and two others were released when arraigned last Thursday before Judge Dan A. McGaffey in Oakland County Probate Court. The fifth boy has been sent to a re-forestation camp. The boys whose cases were held up for "later disposition" were Charles Hale, 2395 Rockwell avenue, Berkeley, reputed 13-year-old ring leader of the group, and his brother, Eugene, 16. Charles Hale is a member of the ring, police said. Two 16-year-old Birmingham boys charged with stealing gasoline from parked cars, who were also arraigned in Probate Court Thursday, were released to their parents. Another member of the gas-stealing ring had previously been sentenced to serve 15 days in the County Jail, and a fourth had been placed on probation for two years by Justice Forbes S. Hascall in Municipal Court.

**City Petitions Court For Dividend Check**  
Seeks Release Of \$591 From Escrow Deposit Of Bloombury Corporation  
Municipal Court Justice Forbes S. Hascall, acting as attorney for the city, has prepared a petition to be filed in Circuit Court for a hearing Oct. 9, asking that a check for \$591.84, representing the 5 percent dividend payment on an escrow deposit in the First State Savings Bank, be turned over to the city.  
The check was made out jointly to the city and the Bloombury Corporation, developers of Harrogate Subdivision for a dividend payment on a deposit of \$11,627.58 deposited in escrow to cover the cost of street improvements the corporation had asked the city to make in 1929.  
Some of the improvements were made, and the corporation still owed the city \$9,122.25 for the work at the time the bank closed with the \$11,627.58 still in the escrow fund, according to the petition.  
The city contends the entire dividend of \$591.84 should be paid over to it to apply against the corporation's indebtedness. The corporation, meanwhile, has assigned the check to William J. Beatty, contract seller of the property on which the subdivision was developed, the petition says.

**80-Year-Old Driver Is Injured In Crash**  
An 80-year-old motorist was cut and bruised about the head last Thursday morning when his car was hit by a truck on South Woodward avenue at Humphrey street.  
He is L. D. Miller, Adams and Town Line roads, who was traveling south on Woodward after turning out of Adams road, when his car was struck in the rear by a truck driven by Henry Maus, 29 years old, of R. D. 1, Munger, Mich. It was raining at the time, and Maus told police his windshield wiper was not working.  
Miller's car was badly damaged, and a lot of grapes and melons he was carrying was ruined. His injuries were treated by Dr. O. Beck.

**Local Contractors Begin NRA Project**  
Work was begun late last week by a Birmingham road building firm on a part of the first road construction work awarded by the state on federal road building grants allowed under the NRA.  
The project is a new 8.8 mile concrete road to be known as the "Masterson" Spur. The Brothers Construction Company of Birmingham, awarded an \$87,117 contract for the 7.8 mile which are to be in Lapeer County, extending from the county line south to a point west of Tomora, began excavation last week. The C. A. Handyside Construction Company of Detroit was awarded the additional 4.6 miles of the project which will extend south into Oakland County from the county line.  
Actual paving was to begin some time this week on the north branch, according to James W. Taylor of the Birmingham firm. The good weather, the project will be completed before the end of the year, he said. About 160 men, working in double shifts of 75 men each, are being employed on the road.
