GOLF THE RULES LISTED

They Are The Simple Rules Of Common Sense, Expert Says

Healthy homes produce healthy children—not so much because of heredity as because there is the proper eating, plenty of rest, tranquility and cleanliness of the child's habits automatically.
For the same reason, unhealthy homes tend to produce children with health defects. The child of such a home does not have an opportunity to learn "good" health habits. He inherits the bad health habits of his parents.
Fundamental Rules
Briefly, the fundamental rules for good health, both for adults and children, are:
1. Eat properly plenty of milk, vegetables, fruits, bread and other simple foods.
2. Regular exercise—but not too much—in the open air and sunlight.
3. Children should have nine to 12 hours sleep at night, according to age, with an afternoon nap, if possible.
4. Keep clean.
These rules are so simple and are based so much on ordinary common sense that it is surprising that they are so little understood by grownups. Yet it is a fact that relatively few adults do understand them or practice them.
Health Teaching
Schools must teach these rules to children, for health teaching is a fundamental part of the educational process, but parents must also assume the responsibility of teaching them—and what is more—of practicing them.
Children learn by imitating, and practices learned in the home will often endure for a lifetime, while those learned in school and not followed at home will have relatively little effect.

This is the second of a series of articles on the health of school children prepared for the Birmingham Eccentric. In this article, Miss McCormick will discuss the selection of foods for children.

My suggestion is that you mix a good sized batch of biscuits—according to the size of your family. Bake what you need for luncheon and leave the rest to be baked for dinner dessert.

Today's Recipes
Hot Biscuit Sandwich—Make plain baking powder biscuits. Bake until the crust is crisp on both top and bottom. Break, do not cut, the biscuits apart and butter the halves. On one side place a slice of tomato, then a layer of mayonnaise dressing and then a slice of minced bacon. Cover with the other half of the biscuit, press lightly together and serve at once.
Meat-Vegetable Loaf—One pound round steak (ham burg may be used); one-half pound pork sausage (may be omitted); one large red cucumber, ground; three medium carrots, ground; one cup ground marmalade; one egg, beaten; mix with salt and chili powder. Mix, shape into loaf; bake in casserole, or cook in waterless steam pressure cooker 40 minutes.
Carrot Marmalade—Two Pounds carrots, pulp of two oranges and rind of one, pulp of two lemons and rind of one. Put these through food chopper, then add two large sour green apples and one large peach cut up small. Also add six whole cloves. Measure all this together and add as much sugar as you have fruit. Put on stove and simmer slowly for about one hour, or until it becomes thick and clear. Boil, and then add seven or eight jelly glasses full.
