Charity Ball To Pay Medical Bills For The City's Indigents

An interesting development in plans for the Charity Ball to be held at the Community House Oct. 6, under the direction of Gordon LeFebvre, Carl E. Tapp and local committee, is the announcement by James W. Farrar, city manager, that the proceeds offered for welfare purposes will be used to defray medical expenses among Birmingham's needy.

Following a conference between Mr. Rupp and Mr. Farrar, Mr. Farrar issued the following statement regarding the purpose for which the proceeds of the ball will be used: "To say that the funds raised by the Charity Ball at the Community House will be used in relieving many cases of suffering in the community, is a mild and colorless statement. Anybody in contact with the welfare problem in any way recognized the limitations of governmental and ordinary charitable relief agencies in ministering to the human needs."

"The essentials of food, clothing and shelter can be provided, but other needs, such as special medical care, appliances such as glasses, tooth brushes, special food for invalids and the like, can generally be met only by such special funds. Relief agencies are constantly thrown in contact with deserving cases too hard to accept organized relief, or too baffled to know which way to turn. "The fund to be raised will be used in such cases, and will fill a vital and ever present human need."
