## Screen's Leading Figure? Mulhall Has Quick Reply

### Takes Second To Name Marie Dressler, But "Best" Male Stumps Him

Jack Mulhall, who has appeared in more than 300 moving picture productions and has been dubbed "the most famous man that even he can't remember off-hand just how many years it's been since he first played the movie camera, harbors not the slightest doubt as to who the screen's greatest figure is today, this character actor.

Following his personal appearance at the Birmingham Theater Sunday night as one of a list of film stars being brought to Paramount theaters in the Detroit district, Mulhall was asked who, in his opinion, was Hollywood's finest actor—or actress. His lightning answer was for his lips: "Marie Dressler."

It took him a good deal longer to name his choice for the screen's highest laurels, from among the male stars alone.

"There are so many good actors in the movies today it's almost impossible to pick any 'best' one," he said. ## Enrollment Record Set

### 2,510 Students Registered in Local Schools at Close of 1st Week

The total enrollment in Birmingham public schools was increased by 46 new registrations last week, and registrations now total 2,510 students, or three more than were enrolled at the end of the first school week last year, setting a new high record for school attendance in Birmingham.

Baldwin received the largest number of new students, 21 being enrolled since the second day of school. Fifteen new students reported to Adams after that date, five to Quanton, three to Pierce and two to Barnum.

Two schools still show a decrease in enrollment this year as compared with that of the corresponding date in 1932. Adams had 75 less students than it had last year, and Barnum has 20 less. The other three schools show an increase over last year's registration.

Following is a summary of the enrollment in each school as reported to Superintendent Charles W. Caldwell last Friday and a comparison with the enrollment at the end of the first week of school last year:

### Mrs. Pinchot's Leadership Bank Dictator Utilities and the Market

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Mrs. Gifford Pinchot, wife of the Governor of Pennsylvania, came to New York the other day. She was a guest at the exclusive Colony Club, 62nd street and Park avenue.

She told Park avenue matrons that there still was work ahead on the picket line.

In a community where Mrs. Pinchot led textile strikers on the picket line, wages were increased \$4,000 a year.

Mrs. Pinchot's example is causing trepidation to the employer of moderate means. Fear is expressed that exclusive Park avenue women's clubs may become "agitation" headquarters.

## 3 HURT IN CRASH, PHYSICIAN FINED

Berkley Doctor Guilty Of Drunk Driving As Nurses Are Injured

A Berkley physician was fined \$75 and costs for drunk driving Sunday night when a car he was driving was involved in an accident in which three student nurses from St. Joseph's Hospital were injured.

The physician was Dr. Jerome Edgewood, 400 E. 24th St., 2451 Edgewood boulevard, Berkley. Police said he was traveling east on Fourth street and drove south on the path of a car traveling south on Woodward avenue, driven by Emmett O'Connor, 217 Elmhurst avenue, Detroit.

The nurses who were injured were Kathryn O'Connor, 82-year-old, sister of the driver, Thelma Mader, 17, and Virginia Heubner, 17. Two other nurses, and Leonard McCarthy, 6419 Lindsale avenue, Detroit, were unhurt, as was O'Connor. The latter's car was badly wrecked, and Dr. Powers was sued for damages in a civil action started by O'Connor immediately after the arraignment on the drunk driving charge.

## Drive On Rackets Pledged By Bogue

Prosecutor Lays One-Man Grand Jury System In Rotary Talk

Arthur P. Bogue, Democratic prosecutor of Oakland County, spoke to Birmingham Rotarians Monday noon at the Community House explaining the various tasks relating to his office. He was introduced by Mark Hardin, a member of the club's program committee.

Prosecutor Bogue stated that his work is divided into two major classes, civil and criminal. He said there has been more civil work this year than at any similar period in the county's history, due largely to the depression and the attendant delinquency, bond issues, and similar problems.

Referring to the one-man grand jury being conducted in Pontiac by Judge Rueland Holland, Mr. Bogue said: "Before I took office last January I was convinced that there was some form of slot machine and other gambling racket going on in Oakland County, and this grand jury reveals that I was right about it. These rackets have their roots in Detroit, and I intend to stop them. Judge Holland is the man who will issue warrants in this case. I am also convinced that a one-man grand jury is of greater benefit to the taxpayers and costs less, than the 19-man grand jury that we had for several years, and which accomplished little."

## COMMUNITY HOUSE NEW Y. M. HOME

The Y. M. C. A., located for the past three years in a building at the corner of Balda street and West Maple avenue, was settled today in its new quarters in the Community House.

To take advantage of the financial savings involved and to bring the Y. M. C. A. into a place where it will be in close relationship with other community activities, the board of trustees of the "Y" voted last week to make the change.

Robert D. Lynd, Y. M. C. A. secretary, will have his desk in the main office of the Community House, and it is planned that the "Y" Club, leaders groups and committees will meet in that building. Practically the only difference involved in the change is that no games room will be maintained as in the old building, Mr. Lynd said.

## Schools Ask Loan On Frozen Deposits

Following a decision made at its meeting last Thursday night, the Board of Education has applied to the State Administrative Board for an emergency loan against its impounded bank deposits, which total approximately \$45,000.

The State Administrative Board has made \$1,450,000 available for loans to school districts with funds tied up in closed banks. The approval of the state banking commissioner and of the superintendent of public instruction must be obtained before a loan can be authorized.
