SIXTY ANSWER GRIDIRON CALL

Eight Veterans in List of Candidates at First Maple Workout

A total of 60 Baldwin High School students responded to Coach Miles W. Robinson's first call for football candidates by reporting to Pierce Field Tuesday afternoon for the first practice session of the season. Eight of the 60 who reported were veteran lettermen from last year.

The coach has nearly four weeks in which to whip his squad into shape for the first scheduled tilt of the season, which will be on Sept. 29 at Hazel Park. Practice for this week will consist of drill in the plays and types of defense and offense to be used this year, and a general conditioning of the entire squad. Regular workouts are being held for the line candidates from 9 to 11 each morning, and for backfield prospects from 10 to 12. This schedule will continue until schools open on Sept. 18.

A Maroon squad has seldom faced as difficult a schedule as that of this year. Although three teams, St. Marys, Fort Hixon and Cranbrook, have been dropped from the Baldwin ticket, three new teams have been added, the latter probably the toughest the local team will meet this season. Toledo Scott, one of the outstanding schoolboy teams of Ohio, has signed a two-year contract with Birmingham.

NEW NATIONAL DOUBLES CHAMPS

Lynd Stamps 33 Y.M.C.A. Summer Camp As Success

The Oakland County Y. M. C. A. summer camp at Loon Lake this year enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in its history, in the opinion of Robert D. Lynd, secretary of the Birmingham Y. M. C. A. and director of the camp.

The enrollment this year was 10 per cent above that for 1932. Mr. Lynd said. This season, 181 different boys attended the camp for a total of 320 camping periods. The number of boys in attendance in 1932 was 173, and the number of camping periods 283. Birmingham boys filled 112 of this year's camping periods, a larger number than any other single delegation.

Among the leaders, in addition to six college students, were three B. M. A. degrees, one with three D. B. A. degrees, one with an M. D. degree, and one with special training in craftsmanship. The average age of all leaders was 29.5 years. The camp opened July 15 and closed Aug. 24.

The craftsmanship program again was one of the most conspicuous features of the camp. Comprising work in airplane and boat modeling, basketry, colloidal working, kite making, metal and leather working, it enlisted 45 boys during the first period, 77 in the second, 81 in the third, and 27 in the fourth.

Under the supervision of training instructors, 28 boys passed the beginners' test in swimming at the camp. 29 passed the advanced swimmer's test, 15 the junior Red Cross life-saving test, and 24 the canoeing test.

For the first time, the camp this year supported four Shetland ponies and two riding horses, which provided the young campers with 472 "rides" during the summer. Another new feature were five canoes, while on another 39 campers travelled the same distance in river boats.

Bird trips, snake hunts and forest study programs, and the campers maintained a "museum" of insects, turtles, snakes and other forms of life on one of the hills near the camp site. A porcupine and two bear cubs were brought to the camp for observation.

Health conditions at the camp were exceptionally good, Mr. Lynd said. With a physician and trained nurse in attendance at all times, there was no serious illness and none of the campers was confined to the camp hospital more than a day, he said. Most of the boys and leaders gained weight during their stay, he added.
