# Adult Education Classes Resumed

**Attendance Falling Off, Program May Be Discontinued Here, Supervisor Says**

Following a vacation of 10 days, the adult education classes in Birmingham, FERA program, resumed Monday night with a general assembly for the students and teachers.

The regular program in effect before the vacation is being carried on, but the supervisor's expectation that commercial classes formerly held in the afternoon are being discontinued in the evening.

Attendance at the classes this week will probably determine how much longer they will be continued, according to Mr. William McCallum, general supervisor.

Funds are available for extending the program to May 1 or beyond if necessary, but several students have dropped out because they have found new jobs which prevent them from attending classes, and a further decrease in the enrollment is expected. It is the sponsors that continuation is no longer necessary here, Mrs. McCallum says.

The FERA orchestra of 10 pieces, directed by Manly Tyson, will be available for the beginning of the assembly program Monday night, and played again for the first time in Birmingham.

**CRANBROOK MASTER IS SUED FOR \$75,000**  
Two damage suits, totaling \$75,000, have been filed in Circuit Court at Mt. Clemens against George Nickerson, head of the junior school and junior dormitory, and instructor in English at Cranbrook School.

The suits are the outgrowth of an accident Feb. 17 near Mt. Clemens when a car driven by Nickerson collided with another machine, resulting in the death of William Spence, 39, of Dearborn, and injuries to his brother, Warren. Charged, Nickerson with carelessness, Warren Spence asks \$25,000, and Mrs. Thelma P. Spence, widow of the man who was killed, asks \$50,000.

# Birmingham Rotary Club Observes 10th Birthday

Birmingham Rotarians celebrated their 10th anniversary Monday evening at the Community House in a program reminiscent of the formation of the club Mar. 13, 1924. The club's charter from Rotary International, dated April 7, 1924, was presented by former District Governor Paul H. King on May 27, 1934.

The anniversary program, arranged by J. B. Howarth, secretary, Dr. Herbert E. Moore, president, and F. Morse Cooke, song leader, was participated in by several nearby clubs, including the Wayne Club, sponsors of the Birmingham organization.

Matt Tinkham, president of the Wayne Club, made the principal address, stressing the value of Rotary philosophy and service as a builder of both the individual and his community.

Mr. Howarth traced the history of the Birmingham Club, delineating its origin here when Clyde Mayben and Geo. Begole, of the Wayne Club, came to Birmingham in December of 1923 to survey the possibility of forming a local organization. They first visited Frank J. Mulholland and Glenn Begie Birmingham merchants, who in turn called in Mr. Howarth and George R. Averil.

"At first we reacted unfavorably to the idea," stated Mr. Howarth, "for we had known that many former organizations were started in our town, only to fail. But, at the invitation of the Wayne Club, we went over to a meeting one evening and were so taken up with the spirit of fellowship and sincerity that seemed to dominate the affair that we agreed to accept their aid in launching one here."

"So 20 of us finally got together and held our first meeting, electing Mr. Averil as the first president. He was succeeded by Louis Clarence Vilet, Charles J. Shan, George B. Buttwell, Harry E. Bissett, Walter L. Connelly, Dr. Warren Gibson, and Dr. Herbert E. Moore."

Chief among the projects sponsored and carried out by the Birmingham Club are boys' work and the starting of the Oakland County Society for Crippled Children.

Musical selections were sung by W. C. Scott, tenor, and Henry James, baritone, each accompanied by Miss Elizabeth Heck, pianist.
