

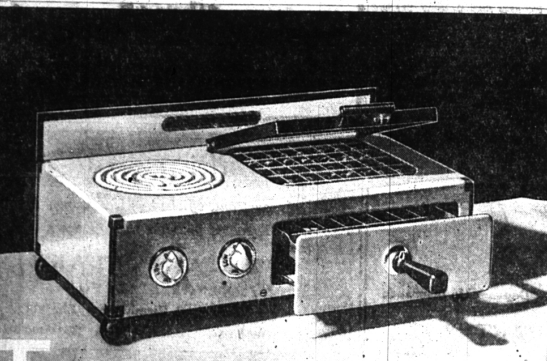

STUDENTS TO TAKE WASHINGTON TRIP

Bank Release Impounded Funds Of Baldwin High School Group

Because their funds were tied up in a closed Detroit bank last year, members of the Baldwin High School Washington Group found it impossible to make their annual trip to the nation's capital and instead took a less expensive trip to Chicago. Now, however, the bank has released the group's money and plans to send away to take the Washington trip this summer after school closes.

As the Board of Education officially canceled this year's trip, the group is being formed outside of school and the only connections it will have with Baldwin will be that its advisors will be teachers and that it will use the money and that it will be deposited in the club's bank with the school treasurer.

At a meeting of the group Monday evening at the Community House, June 25 was set as the date on which the group would leave Detroit, and Miss Helen Hammond and Eugene Hubbard were elected advisors. W. S. Toothacker, the group's former advisor, will act as manager of the trip. Mr. Toothacker said that the trip would be one to enjoy, caring to take it, but that the money obtained from the bank would be divided only among the members of the old organization. The price for the trip has been set at \$15 for the round trip. This includes hotel accommodations, two meals on the train and bus fares while in Washington. The trip will last about four days.

TRUCK TEAM GOES OUTSIDE

First Work-outs Held On Pierce-Field; Inter-class Meet Friday

Coch Franklyn Whitney's Baldwin High School track team began work-outs on Pierce Field Monday afternoon in preparation for its first meet of the season, which will be held Saturday, April 21, at Pontiac, with the Pontiac High School tracksters furnishing the opposition.

Prior to Monday, the team had been holding work-outs in the Baldwin gym, the weather not permitting outdoor practice. Because of the hamping conditions in the gym, Coach Whitney has been unable to get a good line on his candidates, and at present he has only a vague idea as to which men he will use of the varsity squad.

Friday afternoon, the annual inter-class meet will be held at Pierce Field for the purpose of trying out all candidates and determining the events to which they are best adapted.

Of experienced material, Whitney has very little doubt Donaldson, dash man, and Frank Beasecker, high jumper and distance runner, are members of the team from last year who are reporting for the team this season. Beasecker, though with his ankle and there is a possibility that he will be unavailable.

Another candidate who is fairly sure of a berth on this year's outfit is Bob Savage. Savage is a dash man and a member of the relay team that won for Baldwin the state indoor high school Class B mile relay title at Ann Arbor this winter.

Besides the inter-class meet, there are three dual meets, one triangular meet, the state regional, and the state meet on the Maroon schedule for this year. The Eccentric Baldwin has no suitable place to hold meets, all contests are scheduled on foreign fields. Arrangements are being made now for use of the Fenimore High-School track at Baldwin-Berkley meet April 27.

Ergasterion Club To Give 'Androcles' At Cranbrook

The auditorium of Cranbrook School will be the scene of the second major production of the Cranbrook Ergasterion Club Friday night when George Bernard Shaw's play, "Androcles and the Lion," will be presented before an audience of students and friends.

The plot of the play is based on an old Roman myth in which Androcles, a Greek of the Christian faith, aids a wounded lion in a forest, has his life spared later by the same lion in a Roman arena, and is finally set free along with the animal by the emperor Caesar.

The cast for "Androcles and the Lion" is one of the largest ever to participate in a Cranbrook play, with George Pinkerton of Grosse Pointe taking the leading role as Androcles. Norman Getzinger, who, along with Pinkerton, was an important character in the Ergasterion Club's Christmas drama, "Ten Nights in a Barroom," will again have the leading feminine part. Charles Williams personifies the emperor Caesar, and Austin Young plays the role of the ingenious and formidable African lion.

Carl G. Wornberger of the Cranbrook School faculty is directing the production, assisted by members of Ergasterion. Hubert Davis has constructed the scenery, and Mrs. Carl Wornberger, Mrs. Laurence M. Smith, and Mrs. Harold Klein have made the costumes and assisted with the properties.

Jack Lovett is student business manager, aided by Edward Roe, Pottinger Blunt, and a large technical staff. Ticket sales are being handled by Jack Lovett and Bill Lershen.

Petitions are being circulated today for candidates for president, vice-president and secretary of the new Student Congress at Baldwin Senior High School.
