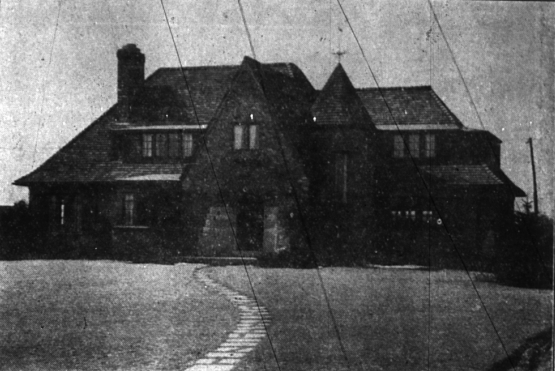

HITLER AND THE JEWS
To the Editor:—Knowing the reputation of The Birmingham Eccentric for accuracy and fairness I take courage in herein expressing an erroneous impression created in a recent issue of your paper. Responsibility lies partly with a certain Mr. Knoblock whose address was reported, and with you for appending an editorialized paragraph at the end of the story.

Mr. Knoblock's theories concerning the Tribes of Israel are not most theories. If he wishes to discard the accepted interpretation of the Bible, however, and to challenge such Christians as Benay, Gibbons, Mommens and all the others who wrote of the ancient world—that is labor is made available.

MENU HINTS
Lamb Stew With Vegetables Green Vegetable Salad Phone 116

A nice flaky pie crust and a delicious filling—that's what a normal health try this pie crust recipe and the prize filling.

Today's Recipes
Pie Crust—One and one-half cups pastry flour, one-half cup shortening, one-fourth cup water, one-half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon baking powder. Sift flour, salt and baking powder. Work in shortening, adding just enough cold water to keep paste together.

Prime Pie—Flaky pie crust, one-half pound prunes, one half cup sugar, one teaspoon lemon juice. Make flaky pie crust as described. Stew prunes, stone, and rub through a colander. Add lemon juice, mixing and crushing thoroughly. Add sugar and flavor with lemon juice or cinnamon. Pour into pie crust, covering with upper crust. Sprinkle lightly with mixed sugar and cinnamon. Bake in hot oven 10 minutes. Reduce heat and bake for half hour longer.
