March Fire Damage Here Totals \$1,225

Birmingham's property loss by fire in March totaled \$1,225, according to the monthly report of Fire Chief Vernon W. Griffith. This included \$325 damage to buildings and \$900 damage to contents. Property endangered by fire was valued at \$141,050, and insurance claims paid on the total damage amounted to \$860.

There were 32 silent and two general alarms during the month. Firemen spent 145 hours and 41 minutes in actual fire fighting.
