### Wedge Defeats Garner Miller For Supervisor; Bloomfield Salaries Approved

Incumbents in all major offices in Troy Township were re-elected Monday in the biennial spring election. Henry W. Wedge, Democratic supervisor, leading the list with a victory over Garner M. Miller, former Republican supervisor, 622 to 498.

In Bloomfield Township, Republican candidates, most of whom were incumbents, were unopposed and only 54 votes were cast. Perry A. Vaughan was returned as supervisor, a proposition to adopt the state zoning act was approved, 33 to 14, and all salaries which had been recommended by a township committee to be paid township officers for the ensuing year were approved.

Glenn W. Ladd, Republican clerk, was re-elected in Troy over Walter Miller, Democrat, 725 to 445. George Keys, Democrat, retained the office of treasurer by defeating Henry Esman, Republican, 598 to 527. Martin Stumpf, Republican incumbent, was re-elected highway commissioner over Lewis Renshaw, 643 to 503.

George M. Brown, Republican, was elected justice of the peace, defeating George Matroff, 564 to 513. Elmer Schroeder, Republican, defeated Walter Buckner for election to the board of review, 612 to 463.

Four Democrats were elected constables. They are Harold Hartley and Hugh Scott.

The vote in Bloomfield Township, and the salary figure recommended for each office follows:

Perry A. Vaughan, supervisor, \$3,000 per year, 50 votes; James V. Bagley, clerk, \$1,400 per year, 49 votes; David E. Anderson, treasurer, salary on a fee basis, 52 votes; Jack E. Wilson, highway commissioner, \$1,600 per year, 52 votes; A. E. Hulet, justice of the peace, \$4 for each meeting, Troy Township Board, 46 votes; Robert J. Brennan, board of review, \$25 per year, 48 votes.
