**URGE LARGER SCHOOL UNITS**

**Crandell, Lederle Declare Greater Centralization Is Essential**

Larger units of administration and taxation, more equitable distribution of the burden of support, and more equalized educational opportunity for children are "the basal needs" of the public school system of Michigan, in the opinion of Charles W. Crandell, superintendent of the Birmingham schools.

Mr. Crandell was one of the speakers at a public meeting in the Community House Monday afternoon, sponsored by the local branch of the League of Women Voters. Together with E. J. Lederle, Oakland County school commissioner, he advocated adoption in the state of a system of larger units of administration.

Mr. Crandell also explained the workings of the Sias-Thatcher Act providing for state aid for schools, and warned "those interested in schools to see that certain groups are not successful in their attempts to nullify this law."

**House Bill Discussed**

Mr. Lederle discussed House Bill No. 44 which would provide for the county unit system in Michigan, and declared that although the bill is not well adapted to the needs of Oakland County, it might fit the requirements of other sections of the state. The bill has been referred back to the legislative council for revision. Either this bill or a substitute measure is expected to be voted on by the Legislature at its next session.

A third speaker at the meeting was Mrs. John A. Venn, legislative chairman of the Wayne County League of Women Voters, who discussed proposed reforms in government for Wayne County.

"If our public schools are to be operated at the least possible cost and with the greatest efficiency," Mr. Crandell declared, "ideas now strongly entrenched in the popular mind will require revision. We shall have to recognize the implications of our transition from a society of agrarians to an industrial society."

**Three Local Youths Win U. M. Numerals**
