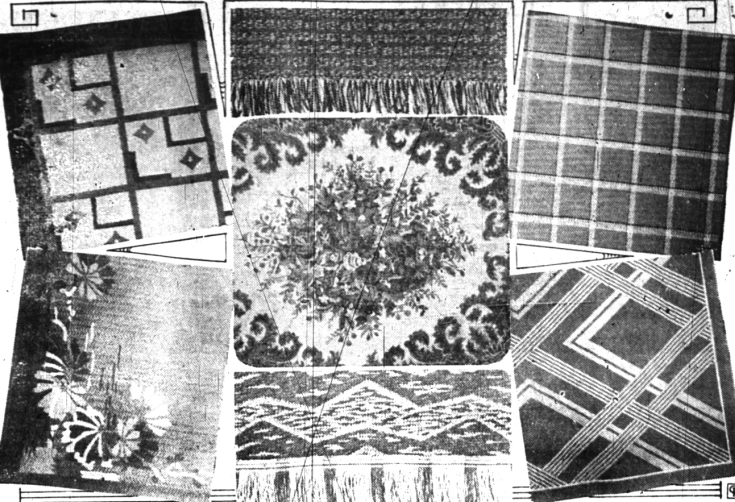

The melon season is here, and how delicious they are! Utilize them in a variety of ways for their goodness and healthfulness.

Today's Recipes
Foosé Cantaloupe Cream—Two medium melons, three tablespoons chopped candied ginger, one teaspoon gelatin, one-half cup sugar, one-eighth teaspoon cinnamon, one-eighth teaspoon nutmeg, one-half teaspoon salt, one cup whipping cream. Chop the melon, removed from the shell, with the ginger. Add sugar, spices and salt. Dissolve the gelatin in two tablespoons of the juice saved from the melon over hot water. Add to the fruit, fold in the cream beaten stiff. Freeze in refrigerator trays or freezer, stirring once during the process.

Cantaloupe Salad
Cut crosswise slices of cantaloupe one-half inch thick. Sprinkle with lemon or lime juice. Place on lettuce and arrange sections of orange or grapefruit petals fashion on top. Fill the center with chopped celery
