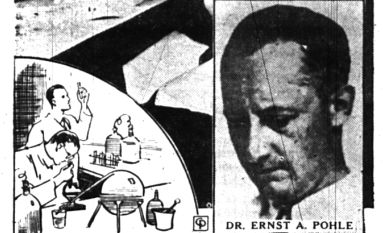
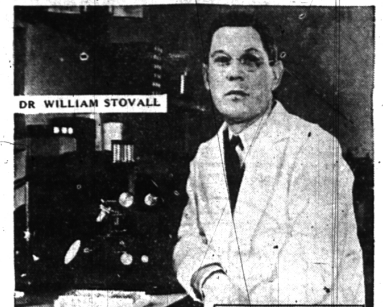

Large Bequest For Cancer Research Spurs Scientists

Woman Leaves \$400,000 To Help In Solving Of Medicine's Greatest Mystery



A \$400,000 bequest to the University of Wisconsin will enable these two famous cancer research workers to renew their efforts to find some clue to the great mystery of modern medicine—the cause and cure of cancer.

MADISON, Wis.—Like a body of fresh troops who dash in to re-enforce a wavering line, medical scientists at the University of Wisconsin, spurred on by a recent \$400,000 bequest left to the university for research work on the cause and cure of cancer, are preparing to help turn the tide against the most vexing adversary that modern medicine has ever faced—tumorous malignancy.

For years now, even while fortunes and lives were being expended in the search for some elusive clue to the cause or cure of the disease, the number of deaths due to cancer has climbed slowly upward, despite herculean efforts to head off the increase.

Every few years some new discovery in the field has held out a brief ray of hope that the disease was about to be conquered, as diphtheria, scarlet fever and tuberculosis were in their time. But thus far the hope has gone un-realized. Lately, at least from an observer's point of view, there has been little progress in the search.

Woman Donor
Now, however, comes the news of this bequest, left to the University of Wisconsin by a woman, Miss Jean Bowman, many of whose relatives had fallen victim to the ravages of cancer.

Chief assets that the University of Wisconsin has at the present moment to pursue the researches for which the funds have been left are Dr. Ernest A. Pohle, Dr. William D. Stovall and Prof. Michael Dr. Pohle is a well-known radi-

ologist, having done extensive work on the effect of radium and deep X-ray therapy on cancer and tumorous malignancies in general. Dr. Stovall, with 20 years of his life already spent in cancer research and study, has attained a position of eminence among cancer pathologists, whose domain is the investigation of the effect of abnormal cancer growths on normal body cells. Professor Guyer is the world-known zoologist whose work on heredity and Eugenics has contributed much to modern knowledge of these subjects.

Research under the terms of the new grant will proceed along two general lines, it has been intimated. One will be in zoology under Professor Guyer and will explore unknown aspects of rat cancer, the experimental form of the disease which more and more scientists are beginning to insist is a different disease entity from the human malignancy. Dr. Guyer is expected to pursue a theory of his which is that some forms of rat cancer, at least, are due to deficiency in the secretion of the sex hormone.

Hopes For Cure
Meanwhile, Dr. Pohle plans to work on improvements in the technique of applying hospitalization, radium, and deep X-ray therapy to cancer patients. Somewhere along in this field Dr. Pohle hopes to stumble on a clue as to why different treatment forms are better for some cancer patients than others, which he thinks might provide the key to the whole mystery of cancer.

Dr. Stovall's work will take on the form of answering the question, "Is human cancer heredi-
