ADVENTURE SERIES TO START SEPT. 30

Kermit Roosevelt To Open Fall Winter Program At Detroit Art Institute

Kermit Roosevelt, son of the late President Theodore Roosevelt and adventurer on five continents, will give two public illustrated lectures Sunday, Sept. 30, to open the World Adventure Series at the Detroit Institute of Arts, this fall and winter. Scores of local people heard one or more of the lectures last year.

In the afternoon, at 3:30, Mr. Roosevelt will tell how he penetrated the jungles of Indo-China to bring back museum specimens of the giant panda, a rare animal midway between a raccoon and a bear. His subject will be "Barguing the Giant Panda." His evening subject, at 8:30, will be "To Central Asia of Marco Polo's Mountain Sheep." This lecture describes his expedition to Turkestan to obtain specimens of ibex and oxis poul for the Field Museum. Both lectures will be illustrated with motion pictures.

The World Adventure Series, which is a civic enterprise whose earnings support the Museum's free educational program, will present popular illustrated lectures by world famous explorers and adventurers each Sunday from Sept. 20 through Mar. 31. A six-page illustrated folder, describing the program in detail, will be mailed to all patrons Sept. 1. The series ticket office will open at the Museum Tuesday, Sept. 25. Every seat in the auditorium will be individually reserved, and tickets will be placed on sale for all lectures through Sunday, Dec. 30. Dr. Raymond L. Ditmars, head of the New York Zoo and internationally known authority on wild animals, will return from his Panama expedition in time to give two World Adventure Series lectures Oct. 7.

Among others who will lecture are Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, Lowell Thomas, Commander Donald M. MacMillan, Congressman Senator Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., Upton Cross, Burton Holmes, Louis Untermeyer and Larry Gould. The series will offer 43 lectures in all. Last year its attendance was 44,317.
