The third race, which was run in two laps, provided the thrills lacking in the previous two. A breeze suddenly gave life to the craft, with the result that the first lap was run in 38 minutes, and the second, in 39 and one-half.

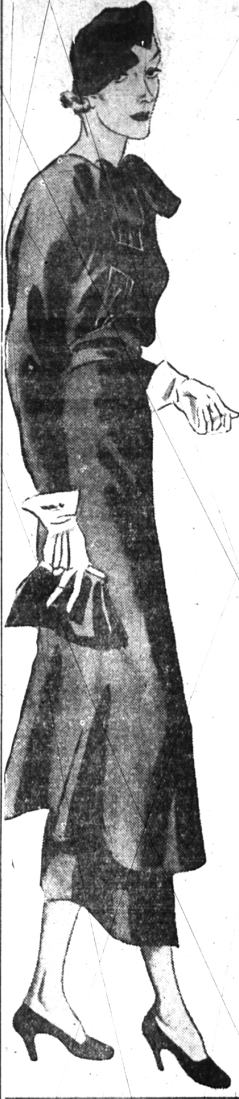
