A regular meeting of the Board of Education was held in the Baldwin high school building, Thursday evening, July 19, 1934, at 8 o'clock.

Members present: Palmer, Black, Rosso, Hardin, John E. Black, Harry Haddock. Minutes of regular meeting of July 5 read and approved.

Richardson's report appeared before the Board requesting the use of the Barnum Band-room for his services.

Motion made by Black, seconded by Rosso, that Rev. Richardson be given permission to use the Barnum Band-room providing all expense incurred be paid by him. Carried.

President Palmer appointed Trustees Hardin to serve on the Scholarship Fund Association for the ensuing year.

Motion made by Black, seconded by Hardin, that Treasurer John E. Black, be authorized to execute \$2,500.00, bond to be paid by the District Bond. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION
At a regular meeting of the Board of Education of School District No. 1 Fractional of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield Townships, Oakland County, Michigan, (hereinafter called Board) duly called and held on the 19th day of July, 1934, the following members:

WHEREAS, there may now be in and may hereafter from time to time come into the hands of John H. Rosso, Treasurer of School District No. 1 Fractional of Bloomfield, Troy, Royal Oak and Southfield Townships, and

WHEREAS, under Act No. 42 of the Laws of Michigan of 1932 as amended and Act No. 26 of the Laws of Michigan of 1933, effective March 28, 1934, the Board is required to provide for the deposit of all public moneys, including tax moneys, coming into the hands of the treasurer, in such banks or trust companies, hereinafter called banks, to be designated by the Board, in such a manner as may be therein provided.

RESOLVED, That said Treasurer John H. Rosso, is hereby directed to deposit all public moneys, including tax moneys, coming into his hands as treasurer in his name as treasurer, in the following banks:

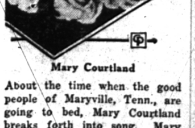
