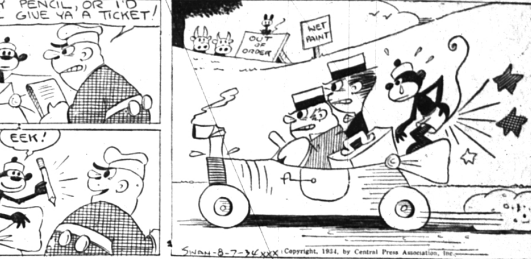

**WHAT IS ROTARY?**

Recently there gathered in Detroit about 10,000 Rotarians from all over the world. What brings them there? Why should they come from Europe, Asia, Africa, New Zealand, Australia and South America? What is behind it all? Surely just a "knife and fork" club—a place where men meet, eat and listen to a speech—is not much of an incentive for men to

travel half way around the world to celebrate. You are right. There is something more back of it. Rotary is the first of several similar organizations made up of business men. To begin with it was organized purely for social connections and the purpose of interchange of business ideas. From that it rapidly grew into a service organization, and finally it grew to a world scope for the promotion of international understanding and good will between nations. With no ritual no past-work, no uniformed officers and no pomp, service clubs struck a popular chord in the fancy of businessmen. They start on time and quit on time. No long-winded speakers are allowed to upset this rule. With greatest informality, members call one another by first, or given names. They raise one another good-naturedly. In short, they act natural and the grumpy man soon finds himself joking and being joked; he enjoys a good meal with congenial companions.

He listens to discussions of current interest and is free to interrupt and ask questions. He is made a part of worthy charitable and civic undertakings. He is urged to take an active part in all other organizations, particularly his church, his community organizations and his local government when called upon. He is led to believe that the people of other countries are as human as he; that they have the same hopes, the same ideas and the same ideals; that a better understanding with his neighbors of other countries, like his neighbors in his home town, generally results in greater freedom of friendship. That is why Rotary and other similar service organizations have grown. It is why Rotarians from far distant countries travel thousands of miles to promote that neighborhood which they hope will forestall another world war.—Schuyler L. Marshall in Clinton County Republican-News.
