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## MASONS PLANNING FALL FROLIC NEXT

Will Be Held Sept. 13, 14, and 15, Large Program Included

Plans for a Fall Frolic, project of the Birmingham Masonic Temple Association, scheduled for Sept. 13, 14, and 15 at the Masonic Temple grounds, Woodward and Forest avenues, are being formulated by a committee under the direction of Clarence R. Cummings, of Floyd Street.

"Those who have resided in Birmingham since at least 1920 will remember the huge carnival the Masonic Temple Association sponsored in that year," Mr. Cummings said yesterday. "It was so successful and so popular with residents of the city that we hope to achieve an equal success with a similar show on this date, 14 years later."

A large program of indoor and outdoor entertainment for all age groups in the city is planned, Mr. Cummings said. One block of Forest Avenue east of Woodward Avenue is to be roped off for street dancing, with music by noted radio orchestras. Other music will be plentiful, and varied entertainment is projected, including rides, a House of Mystery, and an old-time "country store."

"If they would pay a good living wage, everything would work out all right. How can we buy their products if they don't pay?"

"There is too much graft and selfishness around. Some few get good money, while others work for starvation wages. To get out of this, I think the government should take over all businesses all over the country."

To which, of course, the other side responds:

"The government doesn't pay such high wages in the postoffice department." The trend in all countries, however, seems to be toward either strict government control or government ownership. A drastic change at the moment would be a terrible shock to the economic world, affecting all.
